FOLSOM PRISON, Calif., Aug. 25.—(AP)—It's graduation day for 120 inmates of Folsom state prison. After today, the convicts will be ready for outside duty as fire fighters and help fill the shortage of manpower available for combating brush and forest blazes.

The final lessons were given by six instructors each from the state forestry department and the federal forest service, capped by practical instruction in cutting brush and laying fire lines.

Fire fighting training was extended to Folsom prison after the use of San Quentin inmates was hailed as successful by prison officials.
