Peace Objectives

It is a sign of the times, an evidence of our increasing optimism, that almost everybody is talking again about the kind of peace we should make after this war.

Up to the moment President Roosevelt signed the lease-lend act, putting this country into the war in fact though not in name, a majority of Americans were asking bluntly why we should fight—what there was in life conflict for us.

Their question was sensible, and neither provincial nor selfish. They were not inquiring, most of them, whether we should demand money or territory or special privilege for ourselves. All they wanted to know was what reason we would have—if we financed another world war and sent our best youth to die on foreign battlefields—to suppose that a victory would be any more substantive and secure in the 1940s than was the "peace" of Versailles.

Once the die was cast, for the moment such questions became academic. We were at war, then. Like it or not, it was our task to beat the bejebeers out of Hitler and Mussolini and Hirohito, and then make the best terms we could to safeguard our children and our children's children.

We haven't beaten the axis yet. A cold-blooded balance-sheet reckoning would show us badly in the red. But we have slowed the seemingly invincible Nazi war machine, slowed or stopped the little brown heathen, and arrived at a point where we can see daylight ahead.

Naturally, then, we recall the Atlantic charter, which is our only real semblance of a specific internal postwar objective, and we begin to ask how the four freedoms actually can be made effective.

What about Germany? Shall we limit criminal blame to Hitler and a few topnotch Nazis, or shall we consider that only a mad dog race would have played the brutal game as Germany has? Shall we seek to eliminate friction by giving her a more generous place in the international sun, or destroy her as a world power and confine her like a maniac?

What about all the unstable, un-economic, bickering little nations carried over from world war I or set up thereafter? Shall we restore them by duress, or force upon them a sensible economic regrouping that will satisfy none of their peoples?

Are we prepared to insist that the occidental nations shall concede the four freedoms to China, which has done a swell job on our behalf? To India, which we want freed just now, when her help would be useful?

These specific questions merely outline and highlight the monstrous problem which everybody, from President Roosevelt down to youngsters in high school, are pondering gravely.

We can't settle them yet. We can't settle them alone. We're just one of the United Nations. But all the forethought we can give will be so much rich grist for the mill, when the time comes.

was detected somewhere to the northeast of the Solomons.

Our land-based army bombers promptly took off from Australia and at the same time our carriers, protected by other warships, raced out to meet the attack. They found the Japs some time Sunday afternoon and the army flying fortresses attacked a big Jap carrier with four direct bomb hits.

while our carrier planes tackled and damaged a smaller Jap carrier.

Several Jap cruisers and a Jap battleship were also hit and damaged by our carrier planes.

NOTE that it was the Jap CARRIERS that were first sought out and bombed by our attacking planes. They carry the horns of the sea that do the bulk of the stinging in modern naval warfare, and they have to be taken care of FIRST.

The battleship and the cruisers were merely SECONDARY meat.

MEANWHILE the Japs had sent off their own planes from their carriers to race ahead for an attack on our installations on captured Guadalcanal island.

These Jap planes were INTERCEPTED by our fighter planes and 21 of the Japs were shot down with what the navy describes as minor loss to ourselves.

This happened on Sunday afternoon. On Sunday night, Jap destroyers raced in the darkness and shelled our marine-occupied shore positions on Guadalcanal island. What happened to these Jap destroyers is not related in early navy communiques.

Presumably they got away.

ONE gathers from the scanty navy disclosures that the Jap fleet kept right on coming.

At any rate, it is related that on Monday our airplanes hit and damaged a Jap TRANSPORT and a cruiser north of Guadalcanal.

The transport indicates that the Japs are out for blood and intend to land troops (if they can) to drive out our marines.

THAT is the story, as told in the first communique, which adds that the action "is continuing."

That is to say, the battle is still on. There is nothing as these words are written to indicate that the Japs have turned tail, as they did on August 8. Everything we have indicates that they are still closing in.

The real battle appears to be still ahead of us—perhaps is being fought now.

BE sure to remember that the picture of the fight revealed to us in the first communique is ONE-SIDED. We are told of what has been done to the Japs, but nothing is said of the losses on our side.

If you're not careful, you'll get the idea that once again we've plastered the Japs. That ISN'T necessarily true. We've inflicted losses on them, but we have undoubtedly suffered losses ourselves. All the news so far indicates that they're still coming on instead of turning back. There is no estimate of total Jap strength involved.

We'll simply have to wait for more news.

NOTE that there is no mention of warships shooting at each other in the traditional manner of naval warfare. So far the STRIKING done has been entirely by planes.

That is to say, the battle as so far described, is the NEW KIND of naval warfare.

But, of course, it isn't over. Its later phases may change the picture.

Passenger Auto Quota For September Fixed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—(AP)—The office of price administration announced yesterday a September quota of 35,500 new passenger automobiles for rationing.

The quota will be allotted among the states and the District of Columbia.

The OPA also announced that all unused quotas from previous months, which had heretofore been permitted to accumulate where originally assigned, had been recalled. In the future, quotas not used in the month for which they are allotted will be withdrawn at the end of the month.

Quotas by states include northern California 1,689; reserve 189; Oregon 532; reserve 85; Washington 643; reserve 103.
