Old phonograph records, dug out of attics and dusty record cabinets, will furnish material and funds to make new records, so that there will be music in the camps, on the ships and at overseas stations. It will be the latest American music by America's best entertainers, played on new records supplied to the fighting men by the work of the Legion auxiliary.

The first step is the collection of old records in every city and town in the United States. The auxiliary has volunteered to do the job. The national goal is 37,500,000 old records. Roseburg has to date supplied 300 old records. Kay Kyser is president of the "Old Records for Our Fighting Men."

One thousand and seventy-eight juniors have realized the opportunities of belonging to the American Legion auxiliary. Funeral services for Remick Fate, well-known resident of south Douglas county, who died in Roseburg yesterday at the age of 79, will be held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Christian church in Myrtle Creek. Interment will follow in Canyonville cemetery, with last rites at the grave by the Odd Fellows lodge, of which Mr. Fate was a member. He was also affiliated with the Masonic, Eastern Star and Rebecca lodges, besides being a member of the Christian church.

Mr. Fate was born at Days Creek Nov. 15, 1862, and was the last of five children of the late David Fate, pioneer settler of that locality. His entire life was lived in Douglas county, 37 years of it at Myrtle Creek. Surviving him are his wife, nee Alice H. Cornelison, to whom he was married Nov. 6, 1890, and one son, Thomas Epping Fate, of Zilla, Wash.
