God's offer to man is power. Dr. John Baillie of Edinburgh, who was present in the fighting around Dunkirk, tells of that remarkable delivery. Brave men took their little crafts, and risking everything brought their brothers all to safety, and to England. Here was power to save, organized, and used in a remarkable way. Then, a few days later, as some who did not accept deliverance made their way southward into France. He tells of meeting a French soldier so gripped with fear that he was no longer a man. Dr. Baillie remembering the French soldiers of the old way in war, took hold of the man and shook him and called him to be a man again. Fear had destroyed his ability. There is a story of a man in the early church over which we never cease to marvel. You remember about him. Peter was his name, and he seemed to be a bold, daring disciple until the test came, and then he showed himself a coward. He denied Christ before a girl. Later, however, we see this same man as the leader of the small group in Jerusalem. What transformed Peter? It was the power of God. "All power," said Jesus, "is given unto me in heaven and in earth, and behold, I send the promise of My Father upon you, but tarry ye in the city of Jerusalem until ye be endued with power from on high, and ye shall be witnesses unto Me in Jerusalem, and unto the uttermost parts of the world." Brooklyn Defeats St. Louis; Red Sox Win Streak Ended

The world series is beginning to look safe again for the Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Yankees.

What little excitement had been breathed into the two major league pennant races in recent days apparently was expelled yesterday as the Brooklyn Dodgers bounced out of their lethargy and quelled the St. Louis Cardinals 4-1 and the onrush of the Boston Red Sox was checked by the Cleveland Indians 4-2.

The Dodgers had the cocksureness taken out of them at St. Louis as the Redbirds took the first three tussles but the net result of the struggle was to send the Dodgers into the last month of the season with a 5½ game lead.

The Cardinals came back last night with Lanier in the fourth game of the series with just two days rest since he had held Brooklyn to four hits Monday night. The southpaw wasn't up to the job, however, and was shelved for five successive singles and three runs in the fourth. Another lefthander, White, came in and was pelted for an additional single and Brooklyn's final run before getting his house in order.

The veteran Curt Davis, once a Cardinal, won his 14th triumph of the season as he held the Redbirds to eight scattered hits and knocked in two of Brooklyn's runs with a single. Red Sox halted.

The Red Sox string of nine consecutive victories not only was broken in the only American league game, but Hughson's skein of 11 straight pitching triumphs also was snapped as Bagby of the Indians hurled a five-hitter. One of the five, however, was Ted Williams' 27th home run in the first inning.

At Cincinnati the New York Giants beat the Reds 2-0 by bunting five hits in the 11th inning after Feldman and Starr had labored through ten scoreless innings.

Gornicki provided a one-man show at Pittsburgh by pitching two-hit ball and hitting a two-run homer to lead the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 5-0 victory over the Boston Braves.

CHICAGO, Aug. 28 (AP).—It took Ray Robinson of New York just two minutes and 41 seconds to get his 12th successive ring victory last night.

The undefeated young negro punched a short left hook to the chin of Tony Motisi of Chicago in the first round of a scheduled 10-round bout. Motisi sagged as his knees and gradually flattened out on the canvas.

Robinson, who weighed 144 pounds, thus got his second knockout victory in less than a week, having kayoed Colorado's Reuben Shunk in New York last Friday in a quick two-round knockout.

Pacific Coast league baseball fans used to mumble sympathetically about "poor old Tom Seats," but today they have only praise for the plodding San Francisco southpaw pitcher.

Seats, far down on the performance list for league hurlers, turned out a four-hit job yesterday to blank the Seattle Rainiers, 4-0, and outpitch Barrett, the loop's leading chucker.

The lower division Seals bunched three runs in the sixth on two hits and a pair of walks off Barrett, who was charged with his 12th loss against 23 wins this season.

Batters took the limelight at Los Angeles where the first-place Angels pounded four Portland hurlers for 20 safeties to win 16-5.

The excitement was no less at San Diego where Hugh Luby, Oakland third baseman, surpassed a 25-year-old league record for continuous games played by participating in his 679th contest since 1939.
