OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE

PORTLAND, Sept. 30.—(AP)—City police are searching for small change thieves who have uprooted and walked off with Portland's parking meters. City Commissioner W. A. Boves said at least 40 have been damaged or stolen.

MEDFORD, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Because so many people were working in the harvest, the Southern Oregon Pioneer association could not find any cooks for the annual picnic. So the picnic was cancelled for the first time in 80 years.

SALEM, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The state department of agriculture appealed to dairymen today to turn in to creameries all milk cans that they don't need. The department said there is a severe shortage of milk cans, and it is almost impossible to get materials to make new ones.

Purchase Rules On Rubber Boots Are Set Forth

Rubber boots and rubber work shoes of certain types now in Roseburg stores were frozen by the order which becomes effective last midnight, R. L. Preston, executive secretary of the local rationing board, reported today. The order includes all hip length boots, body, thigh or sporting boots, and knee height boots. Also included are all below the knee height heavy and light boots and all rubber pacs and booties and all laced rubber footwear of the same height as well as similar types, with or without laces.

Retailers are advised that inventory forms and a bulletin of instructions are available at the office of the local rationing board.

Beginning Monday, October 5, consumers may make application for certificates authorizing purchase of rubber boots and rubber work shoes.

Eligibility requirements provide that the applicant's work must be essential to the promotion of the war effort or to the maintenance of public health or safety; that the conditions of

work require use of the requested footwear; that employer-applicants must have customarily furnished (not sold) rubber footwear to their employees and retained title thereto; that the consumer must not have adequate rubber footwear available for use; that the applicant must agree to surrender for salvage any worn out rubber boots or shoes in his possession; that the footwear authorized by the board must be of the lightest weight and shortest height that will provide adequate and economical protection on the specific job, and that only minimum quantities be granted employer-applicants.

Consumers or retailers having any questions regarding the order are invited to call at the rationing board office, Preston states.

Aged Prospect Woman Found Dead in Canal

MEDFORD, Or., Sept. 30.—(AP)—The body of Mrs. Ida Grasley, 76, Prospect, was recovered yesterday from a power company canal. Deputy Coroner Carlos W. Morris said he believed she tripped over a guard fence Monday, fell into the swift-flowing channel and drowned.
