

## Yankees Defeat Cardinals, 7 to 4, In Series Opener

Ninth Inning Rally by St. Louis Produces All Their Runs, Ends With Runners on All Bases

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 1.—(AP)—The picture of lion-hearted Red Ruffing, on the brink of world series immortality, suddenly going to pieces and being pounded from the hill under a four-run assault by the ever-fighting Cardinals still was fresh in the minds of every fan who watched yesterday's thriller as the Yankees and the Cards prepared to clash in the second game here today.

It was a game, that first one, that will be remembered a long time. Those who saw it probably will forget the final score in time—7-4 for the Yankees—but they will remember how the 38-year-old Ruffing, within one out of a two-hit world series shutout, had his dream shattered like a thunderclap from the blue.

Some thought the ninth inning deserved to rank in dramatic quality with the storied seventh frame of the final series game in 1926, when old Pete Alexander struck out Tony Lazzeri, and with another wild inning in the '29 classic, when the Athletics scored 10 runs to overcome an eight-run Chicago Cubs' lead.

An important difference was, of course, that the rally failed to win yesterday's game for the Cards. Ruffing, too, received credit for his seventh world series victory, a record unmatched by any pitcher, in spite of getting his ears knocked down at the finish. But that blazing rally of the Red Birds might have an important bearing on the remainder of the series.

Cardinals Heartened.  
As the Cards went out behind their great youngster, Johnny Beazley, to try to trim the Yankees today and carry the series all square into New York, they at least knew that Yankee pitching could be hit. Having blasted Ruffing, they probably stood in much less awe of Ernie Bonham, the Yankees' big forkballer, than they would have if Ruffing had humiliated them right to the end.

The youngsters really looked painfully weak while Ruffing mowed them down for the first seven and two-thirds innings. They were over-anxious and obviously nervous, a perfect set-up for a crafty old stager like Ruffing the Red, whose fast ball isn't what it used to be. Ruffing's first pitch to Stan Musial in the opening inning, with two Red-birds perched on base as a result of walks, was a slow ball on which Musial nearly broke his back.

Errors Fatal for Cards.  
In pitching seven and two-thirds innings of hitless ball, Ruffing, at least, smashed the previous world series record of seven and one-third frames, held jointly by Herb Pennock and Monte Pearson, who were, of course, pitching for the Yankees when they did it.

Wildness, coupled with some jittery support, was what proved the undoing of Mort Cooper, the Cards' ace pitcher, yesterday. He had a world of stuff, but walks kept him in almost constant hot water up to the time he was removed in favor of Harry Gumbert with two out and five runs across in the eighth inning.

Slaughter, Card right fielder, let a couple across in the eighth when he dropped a smash into right-center by Ruffing. It was an extremely hard chance, incidentally, and might have been ruled a hit by a more lenient scorer. Lefty Max Lanier, who hurled the last inning for the Cards, let in the final two Yankee scores with a pair of errors that were real beauties.

Many of the nearly 35,000 spectators had left the park when the Cards staged their amazing outburst in the ninth. They missed something that would have renewed their faith in their team. Starting with Walker Cooper's single that Red Rolfe tagged at

third base but couldn't handle cleanly, the Redbirds slugged six hits, including a triple by Short-stop Marion.

The bases still were loaded, the tying run on first, when Musial bounced to Hassett at first for the out that ended the game. Spud Chandler, figured as the probable Yankee starting pitcher in the third game at Yankee stadium Saturday, finally had retired the side.

**Oregon Fighter Shows Up After Five-Day Ordeal**  
AT SEA OFF THE SOLOMONS ISLANDS, Sept. 15.—(Delayed)—(AP)—Twenty-six-year-old Captain Marion E. Carl, of Hubbard, Ore., second hottest marine pilot on Guadalcanal island, returned to his camp there yesterday after having been missing five days.

His squadron mates had just ended two nights and two days of intense activity with the Japanese, who were making a strong attempt to recapture the air dome. But to his comrades, Carl's unexpected return after being shot down at sea was an occurrence that rated right up with the good news that the Japanese had been stopped.

Carl, who had a score of one Japanese plane shot down at Midway and ten over Guadalcanal island, was perturbed to learn that the only man ahead of him, Major John L. Smith, of Lexington, Okla., had pushed his own score up to 15 enemy planes while Carl was making his way back from the wilds.

"He would run into everything while I was gone," was Carl's comment.

**Rescued By Native**  
Captain Carl was leading fighter planes into a big formation of Japanese bombers and had one in flames and another smoking, he said when "a zero sneaked up behind me and filled my plane full of holes."

"I never even saw him," he continued. "My plane caught fire and I couldn't see anything for smoke. I bailed out at 15,000 or 20,000 feet and came down in the water about 25 miles up the coast. I kept my gun and shoes and watch and started swimming for a small island about a mile away."

"I got within 200 yards of the island but the current took hold of me and I couldn't make any progress. I had been in the water four hours when a native boy came out in a canoe and picked me up."

"When I got to land, he learned the Japs were coming and hid me. Then he took me to a native medical practitioner. My wrists had been burned and he bandaged them up."

After a good night's rest Captain Carl repaired a broken-down radio and sent a message, but it never was received.

He started after a launch, but the natives reported "Japs across the trail." He tried again the following day and found a launch that wouldn't run.

"The next day," he said, "I took the launch apart and got it going. That was yesterday. I pulled out in it in the early morning and now I get here and find Smith's got 15 Japs. I had better get busy."

## High School Grid Card for Weekend In Oregon Listed

Western Oregon high school football teams go into action this week-end, but the top games again will be in the southern and eastern parts of the state.

In the Blue Mountain league Milton-Freewater's Pioneers, who played a scoreless tie with Pendleton last week, will journey to La Grande to meet the league leaders. Pendleton will play at Baker, loser to La Grande by one touchdown.

The Southern Oregon conference also gets under way with Grants Pass meeting a chastened Medford team. The Medfords, rated as one of the state's powers, dropped a 14-0 decision to Marshfield last week, while Grants Pass was tying North Bend, 6-6.

Other Southern Oregon games will send the strong strong Klamath Falls Pelicans to Eureka, Calif., and Ashland to Lakeview. In western Oregon Salem will meet Oregon City and Albany will play Silverton, but most of the other big teams will not get rolling until next week.

Games include: University of Eugene at Sweet Home, Lebanon at Cottage Grove, Forest Grove at Seaside, Siletz at Newport, Toledo at Siletz, Reedsport at Roseburg, and the Tualatin-Yamhill Valley league jamboree.

In the mid-Columbia region The Dalles will invade Camas, Wash. In central Oregon Redmond will meet Burns and Condon will play Arlington.

## Plea for Harvest Hands Waits Roosevelt Action

SEATTLE, Oct. 1.—(AP)—"Encouraging action" from the nation's capital was awaited today by Maj. Gen. H. G. Winsor, regional manpower director, who has appealed directly to President

Roosevelt for action to alleviate the desperate shortage of harvest hands in central Washington apple and root fields.

Gen. Winsor told the manpower commission yesterday he had called the president's attention to the matter and expected results in a day or two but he did not specify what type of action might be expected.

Meanwhile, plans were under way to ship a first contingent of 750 workers from Chicago to Wenatchee this week with an allocation of emergency funds for transportation of harvest hands from the mid-west. Authorities, however, said that 16,000 persons are needed for the apple harvest alone.

## R. H. S. Indians Ready To Battle Reedsport

Coach Jim Davis of Roseburg high school today gave his Indians a light workout, made up principally of signal drill, as the team settled down to await the meeting Friday night with Reedsport high at Finlay field. The game will be the first of the season for Roseburg.

The Indians have been working hard every night for the past week and Davis reports that they have been rapidly rounding into shape. All players are in good physical shape except Harold Cacy, who is handicapped by a bruised elbow.

The team has been working principally upon offense, but was given defensive drill last night.

The starting lineup has not been announced.

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## Youth, 18, Under Probe in Murder Of Aged Woman

AUBURN, Calif., Sept. 30.—(AP)—Glenard Brown, 18-year-old Colfax goat farm worker, was held in the Placer county jail here today as state and local peace officers continued their investigation of the brutal murder of Mrs. Ada Belle Turner, 78, widow of a former Colfax city councilman.

Placer County Sheriff Charles Silva said Brown had steadfastly denied killing Mrs. Turner at her Colfax home Sunday. The youth was arrested here after officers had received tips he had been seen on the Turner place early Sunday afternoon and later near the house with blood on his shirt.

Silva said Brown explained he got the blood on his shirt when he illegally killed two deer and was smeared in handling the animals.

Chemical experts of the state bureau of criminal identification were analyzing water in which the bloody shirt was found soaking, to determine whether the blood was of human or animal origin.

Mrs. Turner's blood spattered body, stripped of clothing except for shoes and stockings, was found in the basement of her Colfax home by a neighbor. The body had been beaten and slashed, the jugular vein cut and the jaw broken.

Silva said Brown had admitted visiting Mrs. Turner's house about 1 p. m. Sunday and talking briefly with Mrs. Turner.
