Freeze Order Hits Used Tires, Tubes

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—(AP)—The office of price administration Wednesday froze the sale of used tires and tubes and revealed that used tires soon would be rationed to provide for all essential uses in conformity with the War Relocation Authority recommendation.

The order was issued to freeze the present supply of used tires pending completion of the new rationing program, which will govern the use of these tires just as present rationing regulations control the use of new and recapped tires, the OPA said.

Freeze To Be Lifted
It added that when used tire rationing is initiated the freeze order will be lifted to the extent necessary to permit sale to certificate holders.

OPA said it was "important to have available for rationing not only the mileage that is represented by used tires with good tread thicknesses still remaining, but also the supply of recappable carcasses which are the starting point of any successful recapping program."

Few Cents For Paper Buys News Costing Millions

American daily newspapers spend a total of almost \$500,000,000 annually to bring the latest news from all parts of the earth to your doorstep every day—news which comes to you at the cost of a few pennies.

According to a recent survey, the expense of gathering and preparing news for publication—editors' and reporters' salaries, charges for transmitting news by cable, wire and radio—approximates \$97,500,000 a year.

Daily newspapers consume paper and ink at the rate of \$225,000,000. The bill for light, heat, repairs to equipment, etc., runs to another \$15,000,000.

It costs publishers \$100,000,000 to get subscribers and deliver newspapers to readers, but from sales they get a total of \$375,000,000. Advertising brings in \$550,000,000 a year at an expense of \$75,000,000.

Ten per cent of the newspaper's gross income goes for taxes, it is estimated. And then there are many additional expenses, such as legal services, bad debts and special promotion.

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Sprague Praises State Response to Scrap Metal Plea

SALEM, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Governor Sprague today praised Oregon citizens for their "grand response" in the scrap metal drive, and said the state's newspapers are doing a "fine job in the promotional work" in the drive.

"Word has reached the state salvage committee offices to the effect that not only privately owned trucks, teamsters union trucks, but also city and county trucks are being offered to the county salvage committees in the collection work," the governor said.

"Here in the capital of the state, hundreds of tons of scrap are being piled up in four or five different locations and city and county trucks are being used, with the proceeds from the sale of the scrap to go to the united war chest of Salem. Word from the Coos bay area is to the effect that the county salvage committee has already gathered in something like 600 tons with an estimated four or five thousand tons available in that county. The Klamath Falls area reports also a few thousand tons available which the Klamath committee hopes to be able to corral during the period of the drive, and it is the opinion of the state salvage committee that Oregon will go over the top in its quota of 100,000 tons before the first of January."

"The prize awards to be made in war bonds and plaques is a grand gesture and we feel certain that with the cooperation of the thousands of school children from October 5 on, it will mean that when final collections are made on October 18, that this intensive drive will find Oregon continuing in the lead in this scrap salvage program."

"May I commend the sincere efforts of our entire populace in this all-out war effort for unless the steel furnaces are kept burning—and they can be kept burning with this scrap metal—this horrible war will be continued far longer than any of us have anticipated."

An undivided one-half of the Northwest quarter and an undivided one-half of the Southwest quarter of Section 8, Township 23 North, Range 8 West of Willamette Meridian.

for the sum of Six Thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$6,000.00); and if the defendants be unable to specifically perform their said contract that the plaintiff have and recover of and from defendants the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) as damage for their failure to perform said agreement; and such further and other relief as to the Court may seem equitable; and for costs in this suit.
