Army Recruiter Seeks Mechanics On Roseburg Visit

The U. S. army recruiting and induction service has many opportunities to offer men who are qualified to serve as mechanics in the U. S. army air force, according to Angus Newton, recruiting officer, who spent today in Roseburg. Newton, who served two terms as commander of the American Legion post at Klamath Falls, resigning to enter army service, is well known to legionnaires here and enjoyed visits with many friends. He will show motion pictures tonight at the open meeting of Umpqua post and auxiliary.

Men who can pass an oral trade test in auto, aircraft, radio or other mechanical fields can find numerous opportunities in the army, Newton said. More than 100 trades and vocations are listed, including watchmakers, truck mechanics, locksmiths, diesel mechanics, etc. There is, he said, an urgent need for men to service the army planes, and men who qualify will receive on-the-job training. Limited enlistments are also available for blacksmiths, powdermen, bridge builders, construction foremen, electrical repairmen, quarrymen, riggers, sheet metal workers, jack hammer operators and other skilled men.

Young men who are 18 and 19 years of age have the right to select the branch of service they prefer. Physical requirements for aircraft specialists have been lowered to include men who can qualify for limited service and the age limit has been raised to 50 years.

Lodges and service clubs throughout the state are cooperating with the recruiting service in the effort to enlist aircraft specialists, Newton states. Men interested are invited to contact the recruiting offices at Eugene or Portland for desired information.

Automobile Tire Theft Charged to Elkton Man

Vern R. Goodell was arrested yesterday at Elkton on a warrant from Polk county, charging theft of an automobile tire, Sergeant Paul Morgan of the state police reported here today. Goodell is to be turned over to Polk county officers, Morgan said.

made good recovery from an appendicitis operation. He suffered the attack and underwent the operation in February, his letter states. He reports that he is now in good health, has received proper medical care, and is engaged in farm work at which he spends about five hours each day.

Slashing on Buckhorn Road Swept by Flames

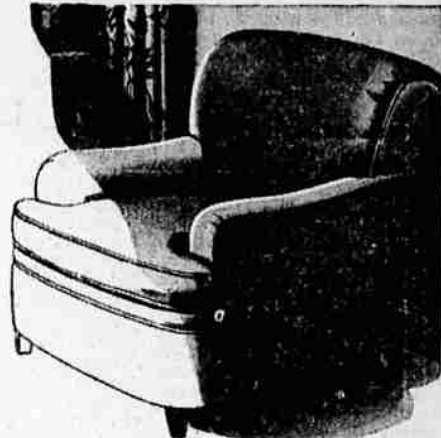
