

Triumph in Series Emphasizes Top Quality of Cards

New Champions Listed With Greatest of Teams; Gordon Major Flop of Yankees

NEW YORK, Oct. 6—(AP)—If it were not for the probability that the war will break it up, the St. Louis Cardinals club that completed the job of wrecking the New York Yankees yesterday might within the next few years go tearing on to win ranking with the greatest teams in baseball history.

It is a fighting baseball club—much better than anyone suspected even when it was running wild in the closing stages of the National league race. There is no team in either league at this time with anything approaching the all-around punch, pitching and polish of the new world champions.

On the off chance that somebody might think we are going overboard on the bold young men of Manager Billy Southworth, a few figures might be in order:

Through yesterday's deciding game at the stadium, which was won by 4-2 on a two-run homer by George Kuroski, rookie third baseman, in the ninth inning, the Cardinals won 47 of their last 57 contests in the 1942 season. They slugged their way to victory in their last six straight games in the league race, paused only to drop the world series opener in St. Louis, and then battered the Yankees into submission in four straight.

It is doubtful the Brooklyn Dodgers could have beaten the Yankees. They lacked pitching. As the series unfolded it became obvious that the Cardinals not only had all the dash and color which had become their hallmark, but that they also possessed great pitching in quantity. Mort Cooper, their biggest winner, was slugged from the box twice by the Yankees, yet they had the men who could take up the slack in Johnny Beazley, Ernie White and Max Lanier.

Joe Gordon Big Flop
The most inexplicable collapse of the classic was contributed by Joe Gordon, the Yank second baseman. Standout of the '41 series, when he practically beat Brooklyn single-handed, Gordon broke only two hits in 21 times at bat against Cardinal pitching and didn't shine particularly in the field. He and Phil Rizzuto did not make their first double play until the final game, whereas they stymied Brooklyn with seven a year ago.

Little Rizzuto played the best all-around game for the Yanks, hammering eight hits in the five games and fielding cleverly.

A world series always has to provide one good opportunity for the second guessers to ply their trade, and this was no exception. Last night and today the men who have had years of experience in managing from the grandstand were demanding to know why Joe McCarthy, the Yankees' pilot, permitted Ruffing to pitch to Kuroski in yesterday's ninth inning. They would have walked him without a second thought.

The situation was this: Walker Cooper had opened the inning with a single and had been sacrificed to second by Hopp. Coming up was Kuroski, who earlier in the game had slammed a long one into the left field stands that sailed foul only by a few feet.

Following Kuroski was Marty Marion, a very inconspicuous hitter, and the pitcher, Beazley. By walking Kuroski, the Yanks would have set up the making of a double play, insisted the men who have made a study of such situations. But what, they moaned, did Ruffing do but pitch to Kuroski, with the results aforementioned.

Incidentally, after Kuroski's looper had disappeared into the left field stands, Marion and Beazley both popped out.

U. S. Planes More Than Match For

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6—(AP)—Official combat statistics, showing that American planes and pilots are "meeting and beating the enemy," convinced a congressional committee yesterday that United States army aircraft "are more than a match for any of the planes that are now pitted against them."

That formal assurance—drawn from the figures of planes downed and from the testimony of some of Uncle Sam's ace birdmen and top-ranking army air force officials—came from the house military sub-committee on aviation.

Reporting on its investigation into recent "criticism of combat aircraft of the army air forces, particularly fighters," the committee held that "the proof of the

pudding is in the eating thereof" and indicated that American army pilots are not fasting. "In the final analysis," said the report to the house, "it is the box score that counts. It is idle to compare the speed, performance and maneuverability of one plane against another when engaged in war. These, in actual combat, are academic questions."

"It is only common sense to say that our planes and our pilots are performing exceptionally well when they are knocking down two or three enemy planes to every one of ours that is lost. Your committee finds that our planes are not inferior to those of Germany and Japan."
