In a significant volume by Irwin Edman entitled "Fountains of Freedom," the author has pointed out the sources of the basic rights of man. However, the author says that freedom and democracy have become slogans and like all slogans are in danger of becoming meaningless. To appreciate their value we must recognize their cost. Freedom and democracy are not mere words. They are deposits of two thousand years of struggle, thought and sacrifice. They are the result of a long process of redemption and redemption is not only a dogma of the church, it is one of the most vital facts of our experience. Always somewhere the price is being paid. Think for a moment of the ransom as it is represented in the family life. Try to measure the cost in blood and tears and pain which has gone into the redemption of the family relationship from the coarse and brutal animism of life's beginning to the chastity and sympathy of the Christian home. Through our sacrifice and struggle the capital funds of human character are increased. To pass life on without increment is to make a tragic failure. Amen.

Giant Telescope to Be Junior High Talk Topic

The first of a series of five programs, sponsored by the National School assemblies, will be presented at Roseburg Junior high school at 7:30 p. m., Thursday, Oct. 8, featuring Robert T. Edgar, who will tell of the 200-inch, Palomar telescope, now nearing completion at Pasadena, California.

The "giant eye," which will, it is expected, reveal many heretofore hidden astronomical facts, is one of the world's greatest scientific achievements. Mr. Edgar, who is recommended by the California Institute of Technology, will tell of this great instrument in a manner which will make its operation and importance more readily understandable to the layman.

His talk will be illustrated with charts, and a large working model of the giant telescope.

His lecture will be concluding the actual work of grinding the 200-inch reflecting mirror, a task that is unparalleled in scientific history for patient and exacting skill.

The program will be open to the public. A small admission charge will be made to defray expenses.
