Salmon Hatchery Will be Enlarged

County aid in construction of the silverside salmon hatchery on Mill creek, in the lower Umpqua district, was pledged Thursday by the county court. George Radich and Frank Taylor of Reedsport met with the court yesterday to discuss the project and requested the use of the county power shovel in excavating holding ponds. The delegation was advised that the shovel will be made available next week.

The hatchery, which has been in operation for several years, is to be enlarged by the state fish commission in cooperation with the lower Umpqua commercial fishermen, the project having recently been presented to the commission by Harris Ellsworth, News-Review editor, at the request of commercial fishermen of Reedsport.

The county court was advised by the fish commission that it is prepared to make the improvements necessary to enlarge the hatchery and joined with the Reedsport delegation in the request for use of the county-owned equipment in making the excavations for the ponds. The holding ponds at the hatchery were washed out by high water sometime ago and the new ponds will be on higher ground.

Prospects for Full 1943 Baseball Season Bright

CHICAGO, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Will Harridge, president of the American league, said today prospects for a full 1943 baseball season still looked "good" despite transportation handicaps and the call to military service of many players.

However, he indicated several changes were in order. These included a contemplated switch from four road trips a season for each club to three, and the possibility of a shorter season. Harridge said eliminating a fourth road trip would save the clubs 20,000 miles and would ease transportation difficulties which caught up with baseball clubs near the season's end.

British Spurning Of Gandhi Brings New Plea to F. R.

LONDON, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Mohandas K. Gandhi's congress party must shun violence and drop any plan to win its aims through revolution before the British will negotiate with it, L. S. Amery, secretary for India, told the house of commons today. Amery disclosed that 846 persons have been killed and 2,024 wounded since violence broke out in India with the arrest of Gandhi last Aug. 8, just when the congress party had made him generalissimo of an intended non-violent campaign for independence.

Sixty of the dead and 648 of the wounded were government employees, including military and police, he said. The India question, which has cropped up repeatedly since parliament reconvened, was raised again as new appeals for United States intervention came from several Indian quarters.

In New Delhi, Abdul Huq, the Moslem premier of Bengal, declared today that arbitration was the United States' duty and that if she intervened "the solution of India's problems would be the easiest thing possible."

A special committee of India's third largest party, the Hindu

Mahasaba, cabled both President Roosevelt and Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek last night appealing to them to urge Britain to declare India's independence.

"There can be no question" of Britain negotiating with Gandhi's party, Amery declared, "so long as there is any danger of a recrudescence of the troubles for which they have been responsible or until they have made it clear they have abandoned the whole policy of acquiring control of India by illegal and revolutionary methods."

Penalty Suspended for Unpermitted Fire

Leonard Bateman, 79, of the coast range district, was sentenced in justice court today to 30 days in the county jail after pleading guilty to setting out fires without having secured a permit. The jail sentence was suspended conditional on future good behavior, Bateman told the court that he was engaged in burning charcoal for a winter's fuel supply and that he did not know he was required to secure a permit.

Weight-Lifting Limit For Women Still Holds

PORTLAND, Oct. 8.—(AP)—The order forbidding women workers from lifting more than 25 pounds dead weight still stands in Oregon.

The state wage and hour commission ruled yesterday that Oregon industries must observe the law which also says that women cannot be made to carry more than 15 pounds a distance of more than 15 feet.

Mrs. C. W. Hayhurst, Port-

land, commission chairman, said the order, similar to laws effective in Washington and California, may be lifted in individual cases upon a request from industries for exemption. Each case will be investigated, she said.
