Nazis Renew Attacks On City of Stalingrad

Arcle. Nights already have become bitter as far south as the central front opposite Moscow and the chill extended to Voronezh, Stalingrad and the Caucasus. An Izvestia dispatch from the central front said the fear of frost became evident in diaries found on German prisoners and the dead.

Factory Sacrificed.

Amid the littered ruins of Stalingrad the shell of the Stalin tractor factory, one of the greatest monuments to the industrialization of the soviet union, stood bleak and under fire, but still in Russian hands.

Dispatches from the Volga front said that just as the Dnieper river dam was blown up to keep it out of German hands last year, so the Stalin plant had been sacrificed to the defense of the nation.

In this case it became a fortified citadel and in its smashed walls workers and machinery kept turning out repaired tanks needed in the fight for the city.

A Pravda dispatch said that the Germans were battering the factory with mortars, and that its yards were littered with twisted railroad tracks and pitted with craters.

Pravda reported that a grey-bearded elder with a German gun slung over his shoulder stood guard at the main entrance, close to the battle-torn armory, while inside workmen huddled close to the walls for shelter against shellbursts as they labored to put four tanks back in fighting condition.

U. S. FLIERS RAID TOBRUK AS RAF DEFENDS MALTA
CAIRO, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Flying fortresses of the United States army battered the axis north African supply harbor of Tobruk yesterday while British fighters held off a second day of terrific German-Italian air assault on Malta, shooting down at least 24 axis planes and damaging about 50.

The fortresses were said to have scored a probable hit and several near misses on a medium-sized ship in the Tobruk harbor. They encountered anti-aircraft fire which unofficial accounts described as heavy but inaccurate.

Enemy fighter planes were seen but reportedly kept clear of the powerfully armed bombers. (The Italian communiqué acknowledged the Tobruk raid and claimed, without confirmation, that three four-engine American bombers were downed.)

A communiqué said Malta's defenders successfully held the axis airfleet at bay.

Five British fighters were lost in the fighting, but two of the pilots are safe, it was reported.

In the past, violent and continuous air attacks on Malta have meant that the axis was attempting to move convoys across the Mediterranean to bolster Marshal Rommel's Africa corps. The intense activity in the Mediterranean yesterday indicated that this again was the case.

Small parties of enemy transport were reported dispersed yesterday and on Sunday night RAF bombers scored a direct hit on an axis destroyer, 50 miles north of Derna, the communiqué said. Shortly before this action an Italian merchant ship, which was sinking, had been sighted near the same position.

Fred A. Weaver of Roberts Creek Passes

Fred A. Weaver, 45, a resident of Roberts creek, died Sunday at Camp Kohler, California, according to word received here by his sister, Mrs. Nellie McGinnis. Boulders Stymie Job at Mill Creek Hatchery

Members of the county court left this morning for Scottsburg in response to word that difficulties had been encountered in excavating for holding ponds at the Mill creek silverside salmon hatchery. right places at the right time. "We are learning to ration materials; and we must now learn to ration manpower. . . . "In order to do this, we shall be compelled to stop workers moving from one war job to another as a matter of personal preference; to stop employers from stealing labor from each

other; to use older men, and handicapped people, and more women, and even grown boys and girls, wherever possible and reasonable, to replace men of military age and fitness; to train new personnel for essential war work; and to stop the wastage of labor in all non-essential activities."

Stimson Urges Quick Action

Stressing a need for "exceptional soldiers," Secretary of War Stimson urged the house military affairs committee today to expedite legislation for the drafting of 18 and 19 year old men.

In a letter to Chairman May, Stimson said the urgency of the task of building up for the United States the best army in the world "cannot be overemphasized."

"Our own survival is in the balance," he said. "Its accomplishment demands the substitution of current necessity for our peace-time preferences."

Stimson said the necessity for lowering the draft age was this: "That our army be animated by the youthful enthusiasms and resilience of spirit which has surged through all earlier Ameri-

can armies; that in our human desire to protect the youth of our land we remember the terrific pace of modern war, that we realize, above every consideration, the imperative necessity of creating an army as quickly as possible more efficient, more determined, more ardent than Europe and Asia can produce after ten years of concentrated training and indoctrination.

"Youth zealous for power and destruction of liberty is the strength of our enemies' armies. American youth is our strength and despite our wishful thinking or the dictates of our hearts, the virility of our effort must take precedence. We must face this truth: I should be derelict in my responsibility to this country and its heritage should I fail to voice it."

Here are some macaroni dishes that are dependable and exceptionally tempting.

Baked MACARONI & CHEESE

1/2 lb. macaroni 1/2 tsp. pepper
3 tbsp. butter 1/2 lb. grated
3 tbsp. flour American cheese
2 cups milk 1 cup dry bread
1/2 teaspoon salt crumbs

Cook macaroni in boiling, salted water until tender; rinse, drain. Melt white sauce of butter, flour, milk and seasonings; add 1/2 of the cheese, stir till melted. Pour over macaroni in greased baking dish. Sprinkle crumbs and remaining cheese over top. Bake in moderate oven (325 degrees) 30 minutes. For Tomato Macaroni, add 1 1/2 cups cooked tomatoes after half the macaroni is added. Serves six.

QUICK SPAGHETTI DINNER

With ham, mushrooms, tomatoes, and cheese
1/4 cup shortening 1 No. 2 1/2 can
1 large onion (3 1/2 cups)
chopped tomatoes
1 large green pepper 1/4 tsp. salt
per cut in thin strips 1/2 lb. spaghetti
1 eight-oz. can 1/4 tsp. pepper
mushrooms 1/2 lb. grated
1 lb. diced ham American cheese
Melt shortening in deep-sided frying pan; add chopped onion and tomato; add green pepper strips, mushrooms and lettuce, diced ham, tomatoes, seasonings, and spaghetti in order given. Mix well, cover, and cook slowly about 25 minutes, or until spaghetti is tender, stirring occasionally. Add grated cheese, and serve at once. Serves 8 to 10.

MACARONI & Tomato SAUCE

Melt one can tomato soup or puree, butter the size of an egg, in sauce pan and season. Boil a half pound of macaroni, drain, but do not chill. Mix immediately with tomato sauce and serve hot. Serves 4 to 6. For variety: 1 or 2 tbsp. of chopped onion, 1/2 cup chopped pepper or a chopped pimiento.
