Mrs. Richardson, who is vice-chairman of the republican state central committee, is an attorney and served as judge in Portland during the summer. For years she has worked actively on behalf of compulsory military training in the schools and colleges. In recognition of this work she was made honorary colonel of the R. O. T. C. in the 9th corps area, going to San Francisco to receive the citation.

She is a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and has held the second highest national office in that organization. Her interest in Americanization culminated in a citizenship manual for aliens which she wrote for use in night schools in the United States. Three million copies are now rolling off the presses, published by D. A. R.

Mrs. Richardson was recently awarded a medal in Philadelphia by the National Daughters of American Colonists, as the woman who over a period of years has been most valuable to patriotic and defense work. She was the Oregon choice and was chosen from the 48 state choices for the national medal. She is a past regent of the D. A. R.

Dakar Warned by Darlan of Danger Of Allied Attack

VICHY, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Admiral Jean Darlan, broadcasting at Dakar, told the inhabitants of France's west African naval base today that "new dangers are hanging over you."

His broadcast, in the name of Marshal Petain, was the first indication that Darlan, chief of ally Vichy's armed forces, had reached Dakar on a hurried trip from France.

Darlan compared Dakar's situation with that of British-occupied Madagascar and gave the inhabitants the marshal's word that any attack on it would meet the same answer as that in September, 1940, when a De Gaulle-British expedition failed to take the port.

The message read by Darlan also declared on behalf of Petain, "with the most legitimate pride," that charges concerning Dakar were false and that "France never since her defeat has failed in her word."

(There have been reports that Dakar had been used by the Germans as a submarine base.)

The news of Darlan's trip received widespread attention because of reports of the landing of American forces in Liberia and the axis interpretation that this was a prelude to an American attempt to occupy the French west African port.

Liberia has a land frontier almost 500 miles long adjoining French west African territory.

Noted Educator Will Again Broadcast on Annual Lutheran Hour

Opening its tenth season Sunday, Oct. 25, the Lutheran Hour will again present the Bible messages of militant Dr. Walter A. Maier.

The program will be heard at 1 p. m. Pacific coast time Sunday and will be relayed locally over Radio Station KRRR. The broadcast will be presented over more stations than ever before, including the 208 stations of the Mutual Broadcasting system and 23 independent stations, joined in a coast-to-coast network. In addition, approximately 160 other stations in the United States and many foreign lands will broadcast the program by electrical transmissions. The program will also go out by short-wave.

While Dr. Maier is a full-time professor of Semitic languages at Concordia seminary, and carries on his radio mission as a sideline to his everyday work, he has become the spiritual confidant of thousands of radio listeners. A single broadcast has brought him as many as 16,261 letters and in nine seasons on the air he has received more than a million letters. Widely noted for his books on Christian marriage and the home, and for his work among young people, his advice is eagerly sought in thousands of letters.

The counterattacks were declared coupled with an iron defense in this 59th day of the siege of Stalingrad.

Moreover, the soviet information bureau announced that eight axis vessels, including a Rumanian destroyer and a 13,000-ton German transport, had been sunk in the continuing war at sea.

Both the destroyer and the transport and three auxiliaries were declared sent to the bottom of the Black sea by red fleet warships. The others went down in the gulf of Finland, a communiqué said.

Night fighting within Stalingrad was on a small scale. The army newspaper Red Star said "results of the last seven days of battle in the district of Stalingrad show that the enemy is somewhat reducing the tempo of the general offensive and has resorted to the tactics of striking on a narrow sector."

In the Aleutians, where American warplanes are carrying out a raid-day schedule against the last enemy base at Kiska, no fresh developments were reported.

Defeat Of Japs Sure
Meanwhile, China's Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek announced in Chungking that the Chinese armies were making all possible

preparations for a counteroffensive against Japan.

"The Japanese have reached the peak of their offensive power and are now on the decline," Gen. Chiang said. "Allied victory is certain."

At the same time, Tokyo dispatches to Berlin quoted the Japanese newspaper Nichi Nichi as saying that Britain and the United States "probably intended to use the period from November to April for launching an attack on Burma."

Three top-ranking united nations military leaders, Lieut. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell, U. S. A., and the British Gen. Wavell and Gen. Auchinleck, have recently been reported conferring in New Delhi, India, on the prospects of attacking Burma.

"With the rainy season approaching its end in Burma," Tokyo dispatches said, "Japanese quarters expect a revival of operations in this (Burma) war theater."

BRITISH CUT MILITARY SERVICE AGE TO 18

LONDON, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Britain, anticipating possible American action, made youths of 18 liable for military service today.

Labor Minister Bevin announced in the house of commons that King George had signed a proclamation making men who reached the age of 18 subject to the call for national service.

Those who reached 18 between July 1 and September 30 will be required to register November 7 and will be examined later that month and called up for service

as needed, the first of them in December.

Last December the age limit was reduced to 18 and a half years. At the outset of the war it had been 20.

Bevin said the manpower requirements of all services made the reduction to 18 "urgently necessary" but that men would not be sent abroad for service until they reached 19.
