of three miles from the mouth of the river. Each of these boats contained from two to five anglers. The majority of these fishermen were from other localities. More than half were from Portland. They spent \$1 each for boat rental. They purchased meals at the nearby eating houses. They bought gasoline for their outboard motors and their automobiles. Many of them paid rent on cabins. They probably represented an average expenditure of at least \$5 each per day. The fishermen in the 85 boats brought in a total of six salmon and one of these jumped into the boat operated by an elderly couple and was captured, with much screaming, by the lady.

We stopped at the dock of a commercial fisherman who was cleaning out a catch of 14 chinook and silverside salmon having a total weight in excess of 200 pounds. He was complaining bitterly of his light catch. He expected to receive about 5 cents per pound for his fish.

In other words an estimated 250 sports fishermen expended approximately \$1,250 for six salmon, while one man took 14 fish or more than twice the number secured by those fishing in boats, with a cash value of slightly more than \$10.

The proponents of this bill believe that sports fishing is more profitable to the state of Oregon than commercial fishing. They believe that the tourist dollar spread generally over the state is of greater value to Oregon as a whole than the consumer's nickel shoved in the canneryman's pocket. They believe that the sports fisherman cannot be attracted to this state to spend his money unless there are fish in the streams. That is the principal reason behind this bill.

As was previously stated this bill is an attempted compromise. Sports fishermen generally would prefer to halt commercial fishing entirely. In fact, at the time this bill was before the legislature, there was strong sentiment in favor of a law stopping net fishing in all coastal streams except the Columbia.

Proponents of the compromise measure, however, prevailed. They propose to permit the commercial fisherman to continue taking the salmon. In fact, the netters would get 97.3 per cent as many salmon on an average as they are taking now. The bill, however, would save 82 per cent of the steelheads, a recognized game fish, now being taken by the netters and placed upon the market in the guise of salmon.

Insofar as this bill affects the Umpqua river it would make little change. A few days would be cut off the netting season at each end, but would not materially affect the take. Umpqua river commercial fishermen and the sports fishermen several years ago reached an agreement which was enacted into law and which is very nearly the counterpart of the present Coastal streams closing bill. As a result, the season was changed to permit the escape of steelheads. Since that change was made, the winter steelhead run in the Umpqua river has virtually doubled in volume every year, proving that the plan will work. The winter steelhead run on the Umpqua is rapidly becoming known up and down the coast and is attracting an increasing number of winter tourists each year.

We residents of the Umpqua valley who have had experience with this plan and know it will work advantageously should give it full support Tuesday by voting Yes X 310.

U. S. Engineers Score Great Feat In Alaskan Road

EDMONTON, Alta., Oct. 30.—(AP)—The announcement from Washington yesterday that the entire Alaskan highway now is open to traffic indicated the United States army engineer troops have won their race to complete the "Pioneer" roadway before winter sets in.

The announcement means that supplies for Alaska will be moved steadily over the road from Dawson Creek, B. C., to Fairbanks, Alaska, and intermediate points until spring thaws make this "winter" road impassable in April and May.

Supplies will be taken to Dawson Creek on the northern Alaskan railway and will be trucked from Dawson Creek to all points along the route.

Opening of all stretches of the road also will enable civilian construction outfits which are building the permanent road to begin work on any section. The permanent road is being built under supervision of the United States public roads administration.

United States officials have announced that the route from Dawson Creek northwest via Fort Nelson to Whitehorse was chosen for military reasons. This route connects a string of modern airports from Edmonton to Fairbanks.

The United States army engineers built the Pioneer road and it is not just a nine-foot wide trail as originally planned. In September War Secretary Henry

Stimson said the Pioneer road "as it is now being constructed by the corps of engineers is a well graded, well-drained truck road for practically its entire length and will afford two-way traffic over many long stretches."

The Pioneer road does not follow exactly the route of the permanent road, as in many spots the engineers skirted muskies and other obstructions. The civilian contractors will build over these obstructions to make the road as short as possible.

Ten thousand army officers and men divided into seven engineer regiments, and some 2,000 civilians under the public roads administration completed the Alaskan highway job in six months, Stimson said.

Pushing forward at the rate of eight miles a day, they bridged 200 streams and provided a traffic strip 24 feet wide between ditches.

At one point, the road reaches an altitude of 4,212 feet.

Next April, Stimson said, floods are expected to wash out the temporary wooden bridges, "but others will be waiting and detachments of engineers will put them in immediately."

The materials for the highway, the secretary said, came largely from the immediate vicinity of the road.

Concerning the NORTHWEST As Viewed at the National Capital

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 31.—Another sore spot is due to develop among civilian government workers in the national capital now that the new tax bill has been passed. Certain department heads, anticipating the passage of the most drastic tax bill in the nation's history, have passed the word down the line that when it becomes necessary to fill vacancies in the lower salary government jobs (the \$1440 bracket, for instance) no attempt need be made to hold to the usual starting salary but jump to the next higher bracket. The reason for this is simple—only the fortunate few will be able to live in Washington on \$1440 a year after deductions have been made for taxes, war bonds, retirement and other expenses that cannot be avoided.

Dissatisfaction is due to mount among the older, more responsible government employees—those in Washington before the war. In particular, these employees are in most cases carrying a much heavier load of work and more responsibility than heretofore at lower salary than they could now command in private industry.

Many of the new employees lack training and experience. Older and more experienced co-workers are already beginning to grumble because the newcomers can't do their share yet in many cases are drawing nearly as much as the old-timers.

Mott Felicitates Among the 46 standing committees of the house, where the real work of preparing legislation is done, the naval affairs committee stands out like a beacon in the night. This committee, numbering among its membership Magnuson of Washington and Mott of Oregon, is recognized as the most important war committee in the house, due chiefly to the fact that the committee has long initiated and consistently followed its own policies with reference to the naval establishment. Its membership is proud—and with reason—of the committee's record and ready at a moment's notice, or no notice at all, to tell the world of the good work accomplished and the far-seeing recommendations made, but unfortunately not always adopted. This is Mott talking of his favorite committee.

"The people of Oregon and Washington can thank the naval affairs committee of the house for the far-flung naval installations, both on the mainland and the Pacific islands, that today protect them from the enemy. The policy of naval land-based defenses originated with this committee. Tongue point on the Columbia was the first of these units; our recommendation of this location met with inattention from the administration and, inconceivable as it may seem, actual opposition from navy heads for years. But the committee, realizing that without this type of defense, the west coast was wide open to attack from these grimly set about the job of forcing the issues and succeeded just in time. Tongue point was the forerunner of that line of defense units that today also stand as a jumping-off place for the offensive that is bound to come shortly."

Committee Blazes Trail That is the way members of the house naval affairs committee answer their critics, and the record bears them out. Long before the congress got around to doing the job the committee was recommending the creation of a two-ocean navy. Year after year the committee reports called attention to the almost defenseless condition of the country and the tragic results that would follow an enemy attack; time after time they increased the building recommendations of the admirals.

Proposed appropriations—the money necessary to run all federal functions—come in the first instance in the form of a budget from the executive department, the bureau of the budget. They are then referred to a standing committee on appropriations which distributes them to a flock of subcommittees for study and report to the full committee. When the smoke of battle drifts away it is the same old story—the wheel got the axle grease that squeaked the loudest, and the squeak for preparedness was always lost in the thunder from the "gimmie" groups.

For the benefit of the shark on statistics it may be added that the house naval affairs committee is composed of 30 members of whom 18 are democrats and 12 are republicans. Of the total membership 18 are from coastal states, if with them are included the territorial delegates from Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico; five are from the Lakes states, and the balance are from interior states. Iowa has one and so has Missouri. If Mott is re-elected he will be either the chairman of the naval affairs committee or the ranking minority member, depending on whether Maas of Minnesota wants the chairmanship.
