Super Cargo Plane Plans Discussed By Henry Kaiser

BOSTON, Oct. 30.-(AP)-Henry J. Kaiser, the world's fastest shipbuilder with a record of 10 days from keel laying to launching, said yesterday the big-gest cargo airplane in existence would be ready for test flights in 18 months and that he believed "The government will go in for mass production of these ships"
