Why Public Ownership?

Would you willingly turn over the management of YOUR business to politicians? Believing that your answer is definitely "No!", then why are you permitting this very thing to go on in some other essential industry?

For example, consider the electric light and power business. Public ownership of this industry, which means in plain language the placing of this intricate and specialized business in the hands of inexperienced politicians, is offered as a panacea for the so-called inequities of privately owned utilities. Every conceivable inducement has been advanced by the political proponents of a totalitarian way of life to persuade or force the people of Oregon to either socialize or abandon their existing private utilities. Large sums of public money have been spent and every well known promotional scheme has been employed by high-powered government employees and press agents to dramatize and sell the people of this state on the blessings of public management.

Yes, advocates of this new order would have you believe that the people are passionately eager to destroy the heavily taxed and publicly regulated private utilities, but are being blocked by the tricky machinations of scheming leaders of that industry.

The advocates of state socialism imply that private management has failed to develop this business and is failing to give adequate service. Further, the impression is given that such management is selfish and inefficient.

The energy and success with which this industry has developed its markets, and its services, are well known to you as a people. As to management, we in the utility business are just ordinary people—your neighbors. Most of us have been identified with this work for many years, our training and experience lie in this field. Our business, except for the fact that it is more drastically regulated than most others, is like yours—faces the same problems of meeting payrolls and paying taxes. Its success depends directly upon the prosperity of the area it serves—YOUR contentment and economic well-being are essential to our very existence. Thus our operations are controlled by more than strict state and federal regulations — by that too often over-looked intangible thing, your "good-will."

You have been told that rates will be reduced under public ownership. That is definitely possible, for one very obvious reason—exemption and relief from taxation. Under public ownership this business would pay no federal taxes, and while the question of state and local taxation is not fully clarified it is safe to say that public management would never assume the same tax liability as applies to private business.

But taxes have to be raised, so the burden would be shifted to you.

Taxes collected from companies such as ours help provide the revenues to maintain our various governments—federal, state and local. Today one of the national administration's greatest problems is how and where to get the money it needs. In spite of the fact that in the new tax bill just enacted it was found necessary to increase most existing taxes and tap sources formerly considered inviolate, we are told that revenues are going to fall far short of requirements. Many who never before paid taxes are going to, for the first time, know what the call of the tax collector means.

Believe me, public ownership would create nothing. At best it would benefit but a few at the expense of the many. In its claims that it will reduce rates it assures that it will do so only at the expense of the taxpayers. Don't forget that you are already helping to support such distant social experiments as TVA, Santee-Cooper Authority, Grand Coulee, and countless others.

Isn't it high time that we called a halt to this increasing drain from tax revenues? Certainly this is not the time to eliminate further tax producing property from the tax rolls.

Although the issue with respect to the utilities is clear, each one of you must face the real fact—the possibility that your industry will be socialized—for actually free enterprise, the greatest single factor in the building of this state, is at stake.

Unless America as we have known it is to vanish, each single one of us must fight to protect that thing called economic freedom, the freedom to develop his productive abilities and to retain for himself and his family a fair share of the benefits. Unless this freedom is maintained the whole democratic structure goes with it.

Private enterprise MUST be efficient to survive. State owned enterprise is never efficient, for the simple reason that it doesn't have to be. When money is lost through inefficient and inexperienced management the taxpayers pay the deficit. Don't forget—state owned business is exempt from the usual strict checks and balances under which private ownership operates.

Proponents of state ownership and socialization of industry seek to achieve their goal today under the guise of advancing the war effort. This is an absolute misrepresentation. Private industry, free to operate in an efficient, business-like manner, has a record of high achievement in this grave national emergency. To destroy free enterprise at this time would not only hamper the war effort, but would crush the very thing we are fighting for and which has built a great nation.

Eternal vigilance and a clear understanding of issues is the price of freedom. Don't be lulled into complacency. Don't be trapped into believing that there is any short cut or easy way to the better things of life. Get to know and understand problems and issues, and before accepting changes be certain that you know not only what you are giving up, but that which you will receive in its place.

While of course no obstruction should be placed in the path of an early military victory, an alert people must distinguish between something which is essential and deception. For this reason it is today important that each one of us checks every political move, every proposed law, and through our chosen representatives make certain that our economic freedom is not permanently taken from us.
