Armistice Day Observance Here To Be Curtailed

The celebration of Armistice day in Roseburg will be greatly curtailed this year and public functions, heretofore a part of the observance of the day, will be eliminated, Bruce Mellis, commander of Umpqua post of the American Legion, reported today.

The general public, however, is being invited to join with veterans and auxiliaries in a memorial service to be held Sunday night at the First Christian church. Members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans and American Legion, together with the auxiliaries, are being asked to unite in this service at which the Rev. Len B. Fishback, pastor, will speak on the subject, "For God and Country," which is the phrase which opens the preamble to the constitution of The American Legion.

This church service will take the place of the 11 a. m. Memorial program usually held on Armistice day.
