

Oakland Veterans Collect 30 Tons Of Scrap Metal

Oakland legionnaires are claiming a decisive victory over their fellow Sutherlin veterans in the Armistice day scrap metal collection, according to J. S. Maris,

commander of the Oakland-Sutherlin post of the American Legion. In observance of Armistice day, the legionnaires in the two towns had arranged a scrap metal contest. The Oakland contingent met and went into action at the appointed hour, Maris reports. Advance "scouts" from the high school had located and mapped out all scrap metal in the district. Working industriously during the morning, the Oakland legionnaires collected a total of about 30 tons.

The Sutherlin contingent, however, Maris reports, apparently yielded the honors without a fight, as there has been no report of a collection in that area. During the afternoon, the legionnaires enjoyed a pot-luck lunch at the I. O. O. F. hall in Oakland.

Rickenbacker's Pilot Rescued in South Pacific

Rickenbacker's plane disappeared, when the flyer was en route to the south Pacific to survey army air forces for Secretary Stimson and Lieut. General Henry H. Arnold, air force chief.

The war department said in announcing Capt. Cherry's rescue that in the unidentified area of the south Pacific where he was found, "an intensive search of the area is being made by surface vessels and long-range planes."

Cherry was pilot of the Rickenbacker plane. It was last heard from on October 21, in a message picked up by an island station southwest of Honolulu saying sufficient gasoline remained for only about one hour's flight.

Captain Cherry's wife at Abilene was advised that his early recovery was expected.

Besides Rickenbacker and Cherry, others aboard the plane were Col. Hans C. Adamson, Washington, D. C.; Second Lieut. James C. Whittaker, Burlington, California, and John J. Plywood Workers Ask \$1.05 an Hour Minimum

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 13.—(AP)—The west coast lumber commission today considered a demand of the AFL lumber and sawmill workers that the Oregon-Washington plywood industry minimum wage be boosted to \$1.05 an hour to compete with other war industries.

Such a minimum would put the industry in a better position to increase its manpower, Kenneth Davis, executive secretary of the union's northwestern council, told the commission yesterday.

He urged that night shifts work 7½ hours and get paid for 8 hours with the graveyard shift to get 8 hours' pay for working 7 hours. This practice, he said, is prevalent in other war industries.

The CIO previously asked the commission for a minimum of 95 cents an hour with an extra 5 cents for night and 10 cents additional for the graveyard shifts.

Turkey Retail Price Probability Is Noted

PORTLAND, Nov. 13.—(AP)—The Oregon Journal said today that unless the government changes its mind and price ceiling, the price on turkeys in retail shops here probably will not top 48 cents a pound, just three cents more than the present selling price, this season.

Inasmuch as the government allowed the smaller retail shops to take a profit of 20 per cent on the ceiling price paid wholesalers, the new ruling will allow additional three cent rise for handling direct to the consumer.

The general wholesale price today ranged from 38 to 40 cents a pound. Larger retailers are allowed a profit of only 18 cents a pound and therefore must sell at two cents less than the small dealer, the paper said.

ereases could be secured and application was sent at once to the OPA office in Portland. So far, however, no response has been received.

Producers, it is stated, are firm in their demands, claiming that increased costs have made delivery of milk unprofitable, and that they can operate much more satisfactorily by selling their butterfat to creameries and feeding the skim milk to livestock, than by supplying the whole milk to distributors.

The distributors, on the other hand, contend that they also have increased costs and cannot pay more to the producers without advancing prices to the consumers.

Mayor Harris in his letter to the OPA declared that he believed the requested price increase to be justified and urged that an immediate order be issued in order to prevent disruption of the city's milk supply.

combatant ships were involved in the gigantic operation. At a conservative estimate, these would average between 4,000 and 5,000 tons per vessel, or a total of 2,000,000 to 2,500,000 tons.

This total, divided by Patterson's figure of seven tons per man, would give the approximate size of the allied forces now beginning to change the whole complexion of the war.

The figure was supposed by President Roosevelt's statement at a press conference earlier this week that great secrecy was necessary to protect the lives of hundreds of thousands of men.

Latest reports said American assault troops leading the new British 1st army were expected to cross the Tunisian frontier today.

Hittler Shifting Troops.

Meanwhile, Adolf Hitler was moving with desperate urgency to guard the "under side" of Europe from threatened allied invasion. Dispatches from Istanbul, Turkey, said the Germans were speedily reoccupying the Greek coast, heavily reinforcing the skeleton garrisons which have guarded those shores for months.

These reports said Nazi troops from the Russian front were pouring into southeast Europe and that 12 Nazi divisions passed through Rumania alone last week heading toward Greek and Yugoslav points.

Other German legions were spreading along the French Mediterranean coast and along the French-Spanish frontier.

There was still no news on the exact whereabouts of the French fleet based at Toulon, France.

Admiral Jean Darlan, chief of all Vichy's armed forces before he was captured by American troops last Sunday night at Algiers, joined allied leaders in urging the French fleet to escape to Gibraltar.

At the same time, the Vichy radio acknowledged that Gen. Nogues, former commissioner General of allied-occupied French Morocco, had joined Admiral Darlan in allied councils.

Russia Still Holding.

On the winter-gripped Russian front, there was little change in the various sectors.

"In the Stalingrad area, fierce fighting continued," red army headquarters reported. "Our troops are firmly defending their positions and repulsing attacks by enemy infantry and tanks."

Dispatches to Red Star, the Soviet army newspaper, characterized the repeated German attacks as the beginning of a new Nazi offensive, but the official bulletin did not indicate a large-scale battle.

The Moscow radio said today that Adolf Hitler had dismissed Albert Kesselring, commander of the axis air force in the Mediterranean, for failure to tip off the German high command on the American and British offensive in north Africa.

Diplomatic quarters heard from a reliable source that all 12 officials of the Vichy embassy in Ankara, Thursday headed by Ambassador Bergery, would announce their resignation from the Vichy service to join the fighting French movement before the end of the week.

Roosevelt Assures Spain.

President Roosevelt said in Washington today he had received a very satisfactory reply from General Francisco Franco, head of the Spanish state, to his message assuring Spain that the American expedition to north Africa was in no way directed against Spanish territory.

In his message to Franco, the chief executive, not only assured

the general that the invasion was in no shape, manner or form directed against the government or people of Spain, but expressed the belief that the Spanish government and people "wish to maintain neutrality and to remain outside the war."

Advices from reliable European sources said today that Spanish foreign policy, hitherto to a program of pro-axis non-belligerency when Adolf Hitler was winning victory after victory, had veered suddenly toward strict neutrality as a result of the startling developments of the past week.

Beau Jack, Allie Stoltz Set for Battle for Tonight

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Beau Jack, the negro lightweight who owns a dozen pork-pie hats of various colors in addition to an awkward fighting style, also has the prospect of a double defeat tonight—Friday the 13th—in the Madison Square garden ring.

In order to get a crack at Allie Stoltz, classy Newark lightweight contender, Jack had to guarantee the New Jersey scrap-

per a purse of \$10,000. Stoltz gets 35 per cent of the receipts but if that falls below \$10,000, the difference must come from Jack's share.

A crowd of 14,000 and a \$35,000 gate, however, is expected for the 10-round affair.

Stoltz recently whipped Chalky Wright and lost a decision to Sammy Angott, the lightweight champion.

Nash-Kelvinator Plants Still Closed by Strike

LANSING, Mich., Nov. 13.—(AP)—The two Nash-Kelvinator Corp. plants here, war material producers, today remained closed a second day with leaders of the United Automobile workers (UAW) declaring their members were ready to obey a war labor board plea to return to work but that a company "lockout" prevented them.

In Boston, meanwhile, International heads of the UAW called the strike "unauthorized" and said they appealed to the workers to return.

UAW leaders last night petitioned WLR intervention after peace conferences stalemated.
