ANKARA (Turkey) says the Germans are speedily occupying the Greek coast in force, and that German troops are pouring into Yugoslavia.

That might mean two things: 1. That Germany anticipates an allied invasion by way of Greece and is preparing for it. 2. That German troops are being concentrated CLOSE TO ITALY to handle the Italians if they attempt a revolt.

Ankara adds that German troops are leaving Russia in large numbers, but this is a bit hard to believe. If Hitler is being forced to pull his battle-worn soldiers out of the Russian lines to meet an expected assault ELSEWHERE, he is getting in a bad way.

THE news as this is written is overwhelmingly good — so good that it may tempt you to jump to rosy conclusions.

Before doing so, read this statement from Jan Christian Smuts, the soldier-premier of South Africa, issued in London: "The spectacular British-African campaign in northern Africa makes possible a great allied offensive year IN 1943, which might end in the war IN 1944."

The Germans are getting a

hard jolt, but they aren't licked yet.

NEWS from the South Pacific is scarce, but what there is of it is good.

MacArthur's men are still driving the Japs back in New Guinea, with hopeful indications that their retreat toward the beaches may turn into a rout.

U. S. submarines have sunk seven Jap troops and supply ships in the South Pacific, and American heavy bombers have damaged four more—presumably carrying troops and equipment to the Solomons or to New Guinea.

The fighting on Guadalcanal is reported to be in a lull.

It still seems a trifle odd that with so much of our fighting strength going to Africa the Japs don't hit harder than they seem to be hitting in the South Pacific.

What are they up to?

Blind Entertainer To Be Heard Here

Charles T. Collins of Seattle, blind since the age of seven years, will be presented in an Associated Student body program at the Roseburg Junior high school at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, Nov. 17, it was announced today. A graduate of the University of Idaho, Collins has never carried a cane, and depends entirely upon hearing. Despite his handicap, he has supported himself as a band leader, tutor, typist and pianist since the age of 17 years. He has travelled extensively. A student of political science, he is working for a professorship in that subject.

His program here will include a brief inspirational talk on the problems of the blind and the use of the Braille system. He will include rollicking songs and patter and also will present classical music as a part of the entertainment.

A small admission will be charged to defray expenses.

Concerning the NORTHWEST As Viewed at the National Capital

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 16.—Those who had expected Justice Byrnes to get along with congress in his new post as director of economic stabilization because he had been a popular member of the senate before going to the supreme court failed to properly judge the temper of congress at the present time.

Before Byrnes had time to hardy warm his new office chair he ordered the \$25,000 salary limitation into effect. Since the number of men in the United States who earn a salary in excess of \$25,000 is very limited, the administration had not expected that this salary ceiling would create more than a ripple on the surface of things in the national capital. Events have proved this a poor guess.

On the floor of the senate Senator Vandenberg voiced what has been frequently heard in the corridors on capital hill. In part he said: "I am entirely willing to go to any necessary length to make large salaries pay every possible penny of the war bill which can be assessed against them. But if this sort of thing can be done by more executive fiat in the \$25,000 instance it can be done in the \$10,000 instance, the \$5,000 instance, the \$1,000 instance. In other words, I am not discussing the economic validity of \$25,000 salaries; I am discussing the process of representative government."

Vandenberg by no means stands alone in his contention that the administration has exceeded the authority granted it by congress in establishing this salary limitation. Unless this mandate was desired in order to establish a precedent for similar salary limitations in lower brackets in the future, it seems to be of little practical value. Actually, it does not freeze salaries at \$25,000 but allows a net salary of that amount after taxes, which puts the gross salary around \$67,000. In certain cases other exemptions are permitted, and since it is a limitation order on salaries and not on income, lawyers have hinted that valuable employees might receive compensation in the form of stock dividends to make up for loss in wages, although this point has not been clarified.

Actually the injustice of the order is arousing opposition from men who never expect to personally be affected by it. They base their opposition on the fact that the salaried man gets it in the neck while a partner in a firm, a professional man, one who receives his income from investments has no limit placed on his income other than the increasingly high income tax.

Salvage Boats For West

It is stated by R. R. Waesche, vice admiral of the coast guard, that 26 fire boats or barges are being constructed or converted for the Seattle coast guard district, which includes Astoria, Ore., where one of the boats will be stationed, according to present plans. Astoria also appears in line as a home station for a naval salvage unit, according to Admiral Van Keuren, chief of the bureau of ships. Most of the salvage units now in operation are located on the Atlantic coast, but the new program includes several for the Pacific coast the locations of which are to be announced in a few days.

Coast Conference Grid Race Goes Into Scramble

Either Cougars or U. C. L. A. Bruins Loom Now as Likely Selection for Rose Bowl

By RUSSELL NEWLAND SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 16.—(AP)—The knotty problem of who will represent the coast conference in the Rose Bowl on New Year's day was no nearer solution today than it was a month ago.

The conference scramble as of today shapes up in this fashion: Washington State tops the field with five wins and one defeat.

The University of California at Los Angeles and the University of Southern California have won three and lost one. In addition, Southern California has a tie game to its credit—or discredit. Stanford has won four and lost two and University of Washington is a three-time winner, two-time loser and holds a tie with U. S. C. The other five conference teams, California, Oregon State, Oregon, Idaho and Montana are out of the running.

The coast's Rose Bowl nominee, as the schedule is drawn, can be decided, Nov. 28. Otherwise it may drag on until Dec. 12.

Either Washington State or U. C. L. A. loom as the likely choice. The former has one league game remaining, with Washington, Nov. 28. Meanwhile, U. C. L. A. must face Washington next Saturday, Idaho, Dec. 5, and increasingly formidable Southern California, Dec. 12.

Bruins Are Favored

The U. C. L. A. Bruins, refreshed by last week's open date, will be strongly favored to defeat Washington, despite the latter's scoreless tie with the powerful St. Mary's navy pre-flight team last Saturday in Seattle.

All of the U. C. L. A. games are in Los Angeles. The biggest and probably toughest encounter on the Bruin slate will be with the Southern California Trojans, whose 21-7 win over California and 40-0 shutout of Oregon the last two weeks stamp them with Stanford as the most improved teams in the conference.

One defeat during the last two weeks and a win by Washington State over Washington will sidetrack U. C. L. A. and put W. S. C. in the favored spot. Meanwhile Southern California could move into contention or take it all by winning its remaining games handsly and Washington State losing its final, Southern California whipped Washington State last month, 26-12.

Conference clashes this weekend send U. C. L. A. and Washington into action in the south; Stanford and California at Berkeley and Oregon and Oregon State at Corvallis.

Stanford Now Clicking

Stanford and California, rivals since 1892, meet in what followers call the "big game." After a shaky start—three successive defeats—Stanford now finds itself favored to trim its oldest rival. The Indians arrived with a rush when their T-formation started clicking and last Saturday they ran up an amazing 49-13 win over Oregon State after defeat over Washington 20-7 the week before and upsetting Southern California, 14-6, on Oct. 24.

Oregon and Oregon State took terrific beatings last week but will square off on even terms with Oregon State possibly rating U. C. L. A. mild favoritism. U. C. L. A. figures to pass Washington to defeat League-leading Washington State waltzers off the range to meet the second air force at Spokane, after narrowly squeaking by Idaho, 7-0, last Saturday.
