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Beyond the Alps

WE make no pretension to being a military authority. And most certainly we feel very uncomfortable pouring cold water upon the first real heart-warming of the united nations have enjoyed for a long time.

Nevertheless, nobody who seeks to help interpret current events would be living up to his obligations if, in appraising what is going on in north Africa, he failed to get out an atlas and consult the physical features of southern Europe, which we assume is to constitute the site of the effective second front.

This can be done without giving information to the nazis, who know every rock and footpath of those mountainous regions which for our casual purposes consist of variations in the ink colors on maps.

Look briefly at any good physical map of southern Europe. You will see that there is just one narrow path up from the sea which is not obstructed by mountain ranges. That is through the Rhone valley. The mouth of the Rhone, the foot of its valley, lies west of Marseilles, France.

To the west of the Rhone lie the Cevennes mountains, ranging upward to more than a mile in height, but with relatively low foothills and generally good transportation facilities. To the east of the Rhone valley lie the Alps, heralded by Mont Blanc, almost 16,000 feet high.

Italy itself is cut off from the rest of the axis by ranges of the Alps towering upward from 6000 feet, with only one gap until, to the east, the foothills toward the Danube valley are reached.

Thus even the most amateur consideration reveals that reasonably convenient access from the Mediterranean coast to the expanded Reich is narrowly limited. The nazis can concentrate their defenses in a relatively few strong points which we must assume have been thoroughly prepared against any such threat as now looms.

This does not mean that the united nations can not march to Berlin from the Mediterranean. It does mean that the current operations are child's play as contrasted with what is to come if this really is preliminary to a second European front. It means that the casualty lists are nearly all in the future. It means that in the light of the most realistic information available from central Europe those who now talk of peace in a twelve-month must have locked their brains in dead storage before they opened their mouths.

The news is swell. Even second guessing, we agree with the strategists who planned our present course. If it fails, we shall still think they did the proper thing at a good time.

But we want to give solemn, heartfelt warning that permanent optimism is going to result in unnecessary heartbreak later. For us, this war is just getting ready to begin.

DARLAN remains the man of mystery.

Recent dispatches indicate clearly that De Gaulle and his Fighting French are suspicious of him. De Gaulle says officially that he and the Fighting French committee in London are taking no part in the negotiations being conducted with Vichy by the allies in northern Africa.

It isn't impossible that there is jealousy between De Gaulle and Darlan who seems on the face of the incomplete and none too reliable information so far available to be emerging as the outstanding leader of the anti-Vichy French—the place so far held by De Gaulle.

THE Vichy radio broadcasts in the name of Petain a declaration that Darlan has been dismissed from all his public functions and military commands. (The Vichy radio is now under German control.)

Indians, Lithians To Clash Here in Season's Finale

The football game at Finlay field Friday night between the Roseburg high school Indians and the Ashland Lithians will be the last for the season. Coach Hod Turner announced today. It had been planned to play a game here on the afternoon of Thanksgiving day, but Turner reports that it has been impossible to find an opponent for that date. Consequently, it is expected that Friday night's game will be the last for the season and fans who desire to see the Indians in action will have their last opportunity at that time.

The team is in good physical condition, Turner reports, despite the pounding taken last week from the heavier Grants Pass squad. The only casualty is Billy Hohnstein, who is suffering from a very severe case of poison oak. Hohnstein, however, may be able to play part time in the game against Ashland.

Practice on a muddy field and with a wet ball has been stressed this week in view of possible wet playing conditions Friday night. The squad was given a tough scrimmage yesterday afternoon and will work under the lights to night. Only light workouts will be held Thursday and Friday.

Lithians Worthy Foe
Ashland is reported to have a light, fast team, and probably will be the only squad of equal weight the Indians have faced this year. The Lithians use a tricky style of play and, having played in a stronger league this season than the Tri-County league of which the Indians are champions, will be able to show considerable strength, it is anticipated.

The only comparative scores are those with Klamath Falls. The Pelicans defeated Ashland and Grants Pass by almost identical scores, while Grants Pass, in turn, walloped Roseburg, 20 to 0, in the game at Grants Pass Armistice day, giving the Indians their only defeat for the season.

Coach Turner expressed great disappointment over inability to secure the Thanksgiving day game. Reedsport has declined the offer to play here, while Grants Pass and Lebanon, who also were given invitations, have quit for the season. Grants Pass failed to find an opponent for a game this week so closed the season with the Armistice day game. Lebanon had a game scheduled for this week, but Sweet Home forfeited so that Lebanon, too, turned in uniforms. Due to this situation, it is very probable that no further efforts will be made to line up a Thanksgiving day contest, Turner said.

Turkey Thompson Wins Decision Over Dorazio

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 18.—(AP)—"Turkey" Thompson's reputation as a puncher got a bit tarnished here last night in the first eastern appearance of the Los Angeles heavyweight.

The 23-year-old negro floored the veteran Gus Dorazio for a nine count in the fourth round, but had to be content with a 10-round decision over the Philadelphia he stopped in two rounds a month ago in Oakland, Calif.

Dorazio, a 4-to-1 underdog, made things so hot for Thompson after getting up from the canvas that Referee Irving Kutchner named him the winner. The two judges both voted for Thompson. Thompson weighed 198 pounds and Dorazio 193.
