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A Good "Neighbor"

MILK users in the Roseburg area can be extremely thankful that the producers who serve this district are willing to give consideration to consumer needs. Under prevailing conditions producers are making a considerable sacrifice in continuing to maintain an adequate supply for the city and it is only because they realize they have a duty and responsibility to discharge that they now furnish milk.

Price fixing and rationing have resulted in disturbance of the natural balance affecting many commodities, and this is particularly true of milk. The retail price on milk is controlled and regulated. Butterfat, however, is not controlled in price. The growing demand for butter and cheese has resulted in a rising price for butterfat until at the present time the producer can extract the butterfat and use the skim milk as feed for livestock and poultry and make considerably more profit than by supplying milk for distribution to wholesale and retail trade.

Producers also are plagued by increased feed costs, shortage of dairy and farm help, tire and gas rationing and many other factors which have increased costs and made operating conditions difficult. Many herd owners are reported to be working extremely long hours and are laboring beyond their strength because of inability to secure needed help. Some have found conditions so difficult that they have quit the business and sold their cattle. Dozens of head of milk cows have gone from Douglas county to California buyers in the past few months.

Because of this situation, the producers are demanding more money for their product. The only way they can be paid more money is to increase the price to the consumer. Before the price to consumers can be raised, authority must be obtained from the office of price administration. Although several weeks have passed since the matter was referred to the OPA, no reply has been received. In the meantime, producers are continuing to supply the city with milk despite the personal sacrifice that such procedure entails. In some sections of the country this same condition has caused milk famine, but here in Douglas county we can be thankful for the neighborliness that has kept and is keeping a supply of milk available. —C.V.S.

QUALITY and SUPERIOR FIGHTING SKILL.

That seems to be the story.

So let us rejoice unreservedly. But let us NOT get cocky. Let us here at home be proud and humble—proud of the fighting courage and stamina and skill of these boys of ours who have met and BEATEN the best the enemy could send and humbly determined to make WHAT-EVER sacrifices may be necessary to back them up in the long, hard war that still lies ahead of us.

That is OUR part.

GIVE particular attention to this statement, which you must have noted in the dispatches: Among the outstanding reasons for the victory are the DEADLY ACCURACY of our American gunners and the Japs' LACK OF AIRCRAFT CARRIERS. Admiral Nimitz says: "Either they didn't have any carriers left or they didn't choose to risk them."

Either way, it is a tribute to the enemy to the fighting skill of our men—the skill that has ALREADY destroyed the Jap carriers or THREATENS to destroy them whenever they are exposed to our attack.

THE Japs are good fighters. They have proved that amply enough. But don't miss this point in the story of the naval battle of the Solomons.

At one point in the night fighting they became confused and SHOT AT EACH OTHER. Admiral Nimitz says sarcastically: "I hope they matched their usual high skill in that engagement."

THE Japs AREN'T super-men. They make mistakes, just like other humans.

WHATEVER you do, don't get OVER-optimistic. It won't be over until somebody is licked, and nobody is licked yet. The Japs and the Germans have been getting some hard jolts, but they have a lot of punching power left.

THE war in the Mediterranean is smoldering, with flames expected to break out at any moment. Tunisia is the place to watch.

The Germans hold Bizerte and Tunis, and we have to take them. London thinks the Germans may be throwing the first of two newly organized air-borne panzer divisions into Tunisia, across the narrow Sicilian strait.

These airborne panzer divisions are supposed to contain about 7500 fighting men, 2500 service troops and more than 200 tanks each.

THE DeGaulle-Darlan rukus, hinted at in earlier dispatches, flares up in the British house of commons. Labor Member Sir Percy Harris says the deal made with Darlan in northern Africa is a "bitter pill for those who have been loyal to France under the leadership of DeGaulle to swallow."

The purely patriotic view would be that WHOEVER saves France is a hero.

Pure patriotism and political leadership, unfortunately, don't always go hand in hand.

Here's Rules for Agent Registering For Auto Owners

Agents of absentee automobile owners have two methods by which they may register the cars for gasoline rationing. It was announced by the state office of OPA today. These methods are:

1. If the agent shows evidence that he has power of attorney from the registered owner, or if he produces written authority from the registered owner, or if he registers at the school houses.
2. In the absence of power of attorney or written authority the agent must wait until December 2 or thereafter, and then apply direct to his local ration board for permission to register the car for the ration books.

Some schools reported that the biggest problem which confronted them early after registration started, was the cases of wives of men who are absent in the armed services. They must follow one of the two procedures, as also must automobile owners who are unable to register themselves. Except in rare instances the only excuse of registered owners not registering, rationing executives said, would be absence from home or serious illness.

If the registered owner is working and cannot conveniently register at the schools he may fill out and sign the application and send it to the school by any designated agent, however.

Holders of mileage rationing gasoline books will not be able to buy gasoline after December 1, when rationing becomes effective, unless they have the federal use tax stamp.

Women Asked to Turn in Discarded Silk, Nylon Hose

All women of Roseburg and vicinity having worn and discarded silk or nylon stockings or stockings containing mixtures of these materials and who are willing to donate the stockings to the current salvage campaign are requested to leave their donations at the local J. C. Penney company store. Fred A. Goff, county salvage committee chairman, has arranged with Bruce Elliott, manager of the store, to handle packing and shipping arrangements. A depository has been arranged at the store where donations may be left. Five cases of stockings have been donated by the veterans facility and are awaiting shipment, Elliott reports.

It is planned to gather all available stockings from the Roseburg area for one large shipment to be made Dec. 1. By making one large shipment, instead of a number of small ones, there will be a decided saving in shipping costs and at the same time, the material will be easily handled.

Silk and nylon is needed for use in making powder bags and other items needed in the war effort and a nation-wide collection of discarded stockings is now under way.

Mr. Elliott points out that all stockings should be thoroughly cleaned before being donated.

Concerning the NORTHWEST As Viewed at the National Capital By John W. Kelly

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 19.—Inability to obtain sufficient transports (about 500) on time and have them conveyed from Britain to north Africa prevented the new American expeditionary force from landing at their destinations about October 20. Had the armada proceeded on schedule it probably would not have affected the election result by 2 per cent. For months ships were being assembled for the invasion (half a dozen which before the war piled out of ports of the northwest were in the group) and when all was set the election was a thing of the past. Only part of the troops in England and northern Ireland are on this expedition; the bulk of them remained behind, along with the 2,000,000 British soldiers kept in England.

Principal sour note was uttered by that master of words, Winston Churchill, and his remark was not overlooked by certain senators, but it appears to have missed the press. Mr. Churchill, after saying the grand plan was the idea of Mr. Roosevelt and that he was only the lieutenant, declared while Britain is not seeking new territory, it intends to hold all that it now has. This appears to kick a hole in the Atlantic charter. Anyway, the new AEF is fighting to save the Suez canal and Gibraltar, British possessions. There will be reference to this on the floor of the senate or house in the coming months.

Meanwhile no such elaborate plans for fighting the No. 1 enemy of the United States, the Japanese, in the Pacific. Most of the Pacific fighting, thus far, has been defending British possessions. The islands where the fighting has been going on excepting the Philippines, Wake and Midway) are part of the British empire, such as the Solomons.

Brickbats For MacArthur Those enthusiasts who waved their hats for General MacArthur and proposed him for president of the United States have done him a disservice. In the national capital the wives of at least two cabinet officials have been "sounding off" at receptions. They make statements as saying he doesn't know his stuff and that is why the administration did not send relief when he was being attacked in the Philippines; that it was known he could not hold out on Bataan. The more the praises of MacArthur are sung the lower he sank in the estimation of those who hover around the White House. This feeling spread out among many of the brass hats; MacArthur was being made too much of a hero and this aroused the envy of other high officers. Suggestion that he command the expedition in Europe were met with coldness and a build-up was started for officers in the African adventure.

May Cut Gas Ration Practically every barrel of fuel oil and drum of gasoline that is used by the 850 ships in the African crusade (warships 350) is supplied by the United States. The fuel for the thousands of bombers and fighter planes which are raiding Nazi territory and those which are now in north Africa, together with the tanks, comes from wells in this country. This is a heavy drain on the reserves of the United States and there are hints that rationing of gasoline and fuel oil may be stressed deeper than the current plans. Talk is that maximum temperatures in dwellings and business houses this winter may be placed at 65 degrees to save fuel. The pinch is certain on the Atlantic coast and is a possibility on the Pacific coast. Speaking of gasoline, motorists can not adulterate their gas with kerosene to obtain more mileage—that's out.

Exporter Complains A grain exporter who has been in business in the northwest since Heck was a pup writes to Leon Henderson proposing that the government take over all flour mills of that region and produce a standardized flour. He says his business has been investigated repeatedly—but no inquiry has ever been made into millers and bakers to determine why bread costs so much to the consumer. Mr. Henderson replied that a change-over of the mills would
