BUTTE, Mont., Dec. 1—(AP)—Bullets fired with an apparent motive killed Helen Kennedy, 38, Butte stenographer, and James Martin, 71, retired miner and friend of the woman's family.


Police Chief Bart Riley said Martin shot Miss Kennedy three times on a Butte street last week, then mortally wounded himself. Relatives of the dead woman, Riley said, could offer no reason for the double shooting, and said it "came out of a clear sky." Martin's wife, who died last spring, was a cousin of Miss Kennedy and Martin was a friend of the woman's family, relatives told the police chief.
