Blanks Available For Appeals From Gasoline Limit

Blanks for use in making appeals from insufficient gasoline allowance on trucks bearing necessary certificates have been received by the Douglas county war price and rationing board, R. L. Preston, executive secretary, announced today. Operators of commercial and farm trucks and pickups who desire to submit appeals for greater quantities of gasoline than provided in their certificates are advised by Mr. Preston that they should secure one of the appeal blanks which should be filled out and forwarded to the office of defense transportation prior to Jan. 10. That date, Mr. Preston reports, has been fixed as the last day upon which appeals will be received and applications made after that date will not be accepted, according to present rulings.

Blanks will be furnished to all operators calling at the board's office in the Perkins building, or they will be mailed to operators upon request.

The present supply is limited, and is not sufficient, Mr. Preston states, to meet the anticipated demand, but requests have been telegraphed for an additional quantity of forms and it is not expected that there will be any great delay. However, due to the limited time before the final date for filing appeals, operators are advised that they should lose no time in securing and filling out their appeal blanks.

Stenographer Jobs On Pacific Coast Available

A large number of positions are open in Pacific coast offices for stenographers and typists with starting wages ranging from \$105 to \$150 per month, C. B. Calkins, local representative of the civil service commission, reported today. Numerous qualified persons in Douglas county have requested information concerning such work in civil service, but have not desired to go to Washington, D. C., where the greater number of openings have been concentrated in the past, Mr. Calkins stated.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Governor Sprague announced today that he has dissolved the State Defense council, the State Advisory council of the Employment Service and Agricultural Committee of the Employment Service, and the Oregon Economic council.

He said he took the action so that Governor-Elect Spell, who will succeed Sprague next Monday, may be free to choose his own organization to succeed those which were dissolved.

The governor asked, however, that the executive heads of the civilian defense organization continue to serve.
