Meat's Partner In Next Rationing Thus Far Secret

As inevitable shortages of more and more food products become apparent, you might as well know that preparations are already being made by office of price administration for the printing and issuing of war rationing books Nos. 3, 4 and 5. Plans don't go beyond book No. 5—yet—but this first series of five books will provide the hundred billion or more coupons for the rationing of a number of additional items during the next year or so. Just how many OPA isn't telling. If it knows.

War ration book No. 2, which you will sign up for some time between the middle and the end of January, is just the beginning of rationing. It will be good for only two commodities, one of which will be meat. OPA can't say what the other will be, for even if it knew, it wouldn't be wise to give that advance warning to the stores or the customers. Book No. 3 will be considerably thicker than book No. 2, meaning it will be good for more than two commodities. Book 4 and 5 may be still thicker.

The routine for getting Ration Book No. 2 has been simplified as much as possible. All you will have to do is produce your ration book No. 1, now used for sugar and coffee. The data on the over of book No. 1 will be copied off on book No. 2. You'll sign your name. The ration board clerk will tear one specified stamp out of book No. 1 as a receipt for having issued book No. 2.

Meat rationing was first officially mentioned out loud last Aug. 31 when the department of agriculture said it would be set

up in about four months. That was an optimistic guess. It will take at least five months to get everybody set, maybe longer. No one is mentioning any specific date as yet, nor is there any assurance that the two-and-a-half pounds per person per week will be the fixed ration.

Department of agriculture cut quotas of beef to 80 per cent, then 70 per cent of civilian consumption in 1941 for the three months' period ending Dec. 31. Butchers and consumers bought ahead, figuring the cut was meaningless and that they'd be given more when the quota ran out. They're finding out now how wrong they were.



Oregon's mobilization of farm resources for the tough 1943 food production job will start with state wide observance of Farm Mobilization day, as proclaimed by the president for January 12. Governor Sprague has issued a similar proclamation, and leaders of state farm groups and civic clubs, newspapers and radio stations are supporting the observance. During the week following Mobilization day, community meetings to acquaint farmers with all phases of the production program will be held in many counties, leading up to the every-

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farmer canvass later in January. To speed production of tillage implements and other equipment needed for spring planting, the war production board has assigned manufacturers an AA-1 rating for needed materials. A similar rating has been assigned for materials to make farm machinery repair parts.

The state USDA war board will shortly submit acreages and suggested grower support prices for the 1943 canning vegetable program. Price support machinery will be similar to the certification plan in operation last year for tomatoes and peas, but for 1943 will also include snap beans, corn, beets, carrots and cabbage.

Oregon poultrymen can undertake expansion of meat chickens and turkeys with the knowledge

that OPA's recently announced price ceilings will give them returns averaging between 115 and 120 per cent of parity. Oregon's 1943 Food-for-Freedom production goal calls for a 15 per cent increase in both chickens and turkeys.

Between 8 and 12 million bushels of government-owned wheat will be used in production of alcohol during the next three months. Commodity credit, distillers and flour millers are now working on a program to increase production of alcohol for war uses.

The county farm transportation committee is ready to assist farm truck owners with appeals for adjusted "certificates of war necessity." Supplies of the necessary ODT forms and instructions have been received.
