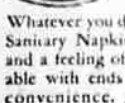

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 6.—API—State Librarian Eleanor Stephens said yesterday that a Victory book campaign, to obtain books for members of the armed forces, would be held from now until March 5.

The campaign is sponsored by the American Library association, the American Red Cross, and the United Service organizations.

She said the army and navy library was pleased with the success of the 1942 Victory book campaign, but that the armed services have expanded so greatly that many more books are needed.

Local libraries throughout the state will be collection centers. She asked every citizen to go through his books to find those in which members of the armed forces would be interested.

"All branches of the service are interested in having recent books, both fiction and non-fiction, including books on current events, on technical subjects, biography and travel," she said.
