Signal Work to Be Taught Here by Lieut. Chandler

A communications school is to be started tonight at the regular drill period of headquarters detachment of the Oregon State guard, meeting at the armory. The school is to be conducted by Lieutenant Henry J. (Bud) Chandler, communications officer for the 17th battalion.

Lieutenant Chandler, engineer at Radio Station KRNR, recently was commissioned in the Oregon State guard, as was Ward H. Cummings, who was made a lieutenant and assigned to the duty of transportation and supply officer. The appointments complete the organization of battalion headquarters. Other officers are Major V. J. Miceli, battalion commander; Captain Charles V. Stanton, executive officer and commanding officer of headquarters detachment; Captain E. J. Wainwright, medical officer, and Captain Perry Smith, chaplain.

The school to be started by Lieutenant Chandler will open with a course in visual signaling, to be followed with radio fundamentals. It is planned to open the course to a supplemental group, particularly high school students, who desire training in signal work prior to probable military service. Enlistment in the state guard will not be required for such supplemental students. Men interested are invited to contact Lieutenant Chandler at the armory or at the radio station for full details.
