Legislators Of Oregon Will Face Knotty Problems

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 7—(AP)—Three difficult subjects—unemployment compensation, liquor and milk control—have provided much verbal fireworks for legislators, and they may be counted on to take up considerable time in the session opening Monday.

All the unemployment compensation fight amounts to this—labor wants bigger benefits and wants the unemployment reserve fund maintained at a high level, while management wants lower payroll taxes, smaller benefits and a smaller reserve fund.

There was a bitter battle last session over this issue, but it resulted in a compromise that failed to satisfy anybody. So both labor and management will be around again.

The liquor battles probably will be fought over whether Oregon-made wine should be favored over out-of-state wines, and whether fortified wine should be outlawed or restricted. And there might be an attempt to make the whole state bone-dry.

Attempts to abolish milk control probably will be renewed even with more vigor, because of the milk shortage over the state. The milk control board originally fair prices to farmers, who were having a hard time of it because of their huge surpluses. But there aren't any surpluses any more.

Fish Issue May Revive

The sports fishermen and commercial fishermen may be expected to tangle again. The 1941 legislature favored the sportsmen, passing a bill to prevent fishing in coastal bays and rivers. But the commercial fishermen won out in the end, the voters killing this bill last November.

Two other issues which will cause a lot of oratory are old age pensions and the state hospital. Both subjects are full of political dynamite.

Several legislators spend most of their time making speeches for bigger pensions. Governor Sprague's budget calls for spending of \$27,155,000 during the 1943-45 biennium, of which almost \$17,000,000 will be spent for pensions. Both figures are up about \$5,000,000.

Tragedy Gets Notice

The deaths of 47 state hospital patients from roach powder poisoning on November 18 will bring demands for more employees and bigger salaries for employees of

the hospital and of other state institutions.

The shortage of help didn't have much to do with the tragedy, which did, however, focus attention on the hospital's problems. This will be hard to solve, however, as it is difficult to construct new buildings and provide more employees during wartime.

Other measures expected to be considered by the legislature would provide civil service for state employees, reapportion the legislature, speed up circuit court procedure, prohibit gambling, increase allotment of state highway revenues to counties and cities, bring occupational diseases under the workmen's compensation law, give pensions to firemen, and abolish the 3-day waiting period for marriage licenses.
