American Legion Auxiliary Activities

The Junior auxiliary met Monday at the home of the president, Ruth Anne Ruhl, and the Umpqua Unit of the American Legion auxiliary met Tuesday evening at the I. O. O. F. hall with Mrs. C. E. Roslund, president, in charge.

Enrolling members in the American Legion auxiliary is more than ever a patriotic duty this year. As the country's largest women's patriotic organization, the auxiliary is carrying heavier and heavier responsibilities as the danger to America becomes more grave. The auxiliary must be stronger than ever before to lead the women of America in patriotic service.

The desire to serve is mounting higher among the women of veterans' families. Our membership publicity work should show them that the way they can best serve is through the work of the American Legion auxiliary. Tell them what your local unit is doing. Uniting the women of America for service to America is the big goal of the American Legion Auxiliary for 1943, according to Mrs. C. E. Roslund, president of the local auxiliary unit.

The auxiliary hopes to bring a greatly increased number of the eligible women into its own ranks and to inspire others to serve in the various forms of national defense activities open to women, said Mrs. Roslund.

The Umpqua unit of the auxiliary is now enrolling its membership for 1943. Wives, mothers, sisters and daughters of members of the American Legion, and of deceased veterans of the world war are eligible to membership, as well as women who themselves were enlisted in the world war forces. All are being invited to enroll in Umpqua unit at this time.

War today is not like war in the past. The airplane has brought war to whole nations, making it necessary for the women at home as well as the men in the armed forces to be trained and organized for defense. The American Legion auxiliary is doing an important part to organize and train American women for defense activities. The Auxiliary sees the solution in good citizenship and is striving to promote interest in citizenship training for both young people and adults.
