Farm Mobilizing Begins Tomorrow

Douglas county's 1943 food-for-freedom program, described as the toughest job in history, will be launched on January 12, proclaimed National Farm Mobilization day by President Roosevelt.

Participating in the event, which will serve as a send-off in the drive to fully mobilize all farm resources behind the food production program, is being worked out by the county USDA war board and an informal committee of farm, business and civic leaders.

The county observance will tie in with events being planned on a nationwide scale, including a radio broadcast by all well-known united nations leaders at one p. m.

Meetings will be held during the week, leading to the every-farmer canvass, when the goals will be discussed with each farm family by their community AAA committeemen.

War Board Chairman Leo Sparks pointed out that the mobilization of this county's agricultural resources for all-out production will continue after Mobilization day. He called for a general observation of the day so that all people, both farm and city, will have a clear understanding of the urgent need for food.
