Farm WAR NEWS

Two actions designed to increase the supply of oilmeal for livestock and poultry feeders were announced last week. Commodity credit issued an order prohibiting the use of oilseed meals in mixed fertilizers. The war production board gave permission for the importation from Mexico of as much cottonseed and other meals as possible. The shortage of these concentrates has been particularly acute here in the northwest, but it is expected to improve during the next few months.

All retail sales of used farm tractors, combines, corn pickers and hay balers are now under price control. Here's the most that the seller, either private owner or auctioneer, can charge; 85 per cent of the base price for machines less than one year old, 75 per cent if more than one year old.

Several additions have been made to the list of essential farm commodities used by selective

service as a basis for draft deferment under the war units plan. Essential ratings have been given to alfalfa seed, other tame hay and seed, grapes, beets, sugar beet seed, honey, sows for farrowing and a number of others. War ratings for each farm will be determined during the coming farm mobilization sign-up drive.

Oregon growers can take credit for the biggest part of this year's record production of winter cover crop seeds. Figures just announced place the total national out-put of Austrian winter peas, vetch, crimson clover and ryegrass seed at 261,630,000 pounds, compared with 124,040,000 pounds in 1941.

Levels at which the government will support grower prices for canning vegetables will be announced about February 1. Recommended prices for Oregon have been forwarded by the state USDA war board.

"Every extra pound of essential food we can produce in 1943 will help shorten the war," declares Robert B. Taylor, chairman of Oregon's USDA war board, in calling for the cooperation of every farm family in completing the farm mobilization sign-up drive launched in every county this week. He asked that all possible assistance be given the committeemen who will contact every

farmer to help work out the best way that each farm can contribute a maximum of needed commodities.

Housewives may find slightly higher retail prices for poultry and citrus fruits, but butter and cheese prices should remain almost unchanged as result of new OPA price ceilings on those commodities. The new ceilings became effective January 14, replaced retail ceilings based on September 28/October 2 levels.

In addition to the eight designated war crops—potatoes, dry beans, dry edible peas, canning peas, tomatoes for processing, flax for seed or fiber and vetch for seed—the following crops may be substituted for wheat to meet 90 per cent of allotment requirements of the 1943 AAA program: Legume hay, oats and vetch or oats and peas for hay, permanent pastures, Austrian peas and barley for grain. To qualify as substitute crops, seedlings of Austrian peas, hay, barley or permanent pastures must be above normal plantings.

Farm operators will pay the new five per cent Victory tax on their net incomes, not gross incomes. The farmer is not responsible for payment of Victory tax by his hired hands. Farm workers must make their own arrangements for deducting tax from annual salary in excess of \$624.

Soldiers over 38 and their employers must initiate any action for releases from the army to return to essential war jobs, including agriculture.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13 (AP) Secretary of State Hull disclosed today that Charles Beaux, American industrial engineer known as the author of an "efficiency system" for industrial labor, had been arrested in North Africa on a charge of trading with the enemy.

Hull said that news of Beaux's arrest had come to him but that he was not informed of the details. Beaux came into news prominence in 1938 when it was disclosed that he was arranging the details of an American tour which the Duke of Windsor was planning to make. Windsor subsequently dropped the idea of the visit.
