Ban Hits Purchase Of 'Meat-on-Hoof' By Employers

Logging operators and other employers are no longer permitted to buy meat "on the hoof" to kill and serve to their own employees, according to a new ruling from the national office of price administration.

The new rule reverses a previous interpretation of the meat restriction order which had permitted this practice, said the state OPA, and will insure more equitable distribution of meat and prevent a favored few from receiving a preference in this scarce commodity.

The reversal was based on the interpretation that a "delivery" constituted any transfer to another person, and that permitting employers to slaughter "on the hoof" in order to serve their own employees violates the spirit of the restriction order by favoring only a few.

The new ruling applies to all industrial, commercial, agricultural and all other employers serving meat to their employees, said the OPA.

R. H. S. Indians Dated Saturday Against Coos Five

The Roseburg high school Indians are making preparations to meet Marshfield Saturday at the senior high school gymnasium here in a basketball game that promises plenty of action. The game does not count in conference standings, but the Indians will endeavor to make their victories two in a row over the Coos boys team, having won by a close score in an invasion of the bay district earlier in the season.

Coach Hod Turner has been working to clear up defensive weaknesses shown in the two sectional contests played here last Friday and Saturday against Medford. Although Roseburg won the two games, each by a one-point margin, the team showed a decided weakness in handling recoveries off the backboards despite an advantage in height.

Coach Turner and Clyde Beard, principal of the high school, were in Eugene today attending a conference relating to the physical fitness program being planned in all high schools as a part of the war effort.

Two Youths Fined for Theft of Gasoline

Virgil Gustasson, 17, Drain, and Norval Shannon, 16, Springfield, were returned here yesterday from Drain, where they were arrested on larceny charges filed in Douglas county. The two youths were accused of the theft of gasoline from the Clyde Catching camp on upper Smith river. Gustasson was fined \$25 and Shannon was fined a like amount, in addition to receiving a 10-day jail sentence, after entering pleas of guilty in the justice court at Drain when arraigned before Judge Clarence Leonard. Both were continued in custody in lieu of payment of the fines.

MCCORD FIELD, Jan. 14.—(AP)—The pilot of a single seater McCord field plane was killed in a crash at Coal Creek mountain, northeast of Renton, Wash., at about 7 p. m., Wednesday, it was announced today by the public relations office. The flyer was on a routine training flight and a board of officers has been appointed to determine the cause of the accident. Identity of the pilot will not be announced until after his family has been notified.

U. of O. Hoopsters Defeat Idaho in Hard Battle, 34-31

MOSCOW, Idaho, Jan. 14.—(AP)—With the Washington State basketball squad looking on, the University of Oregon was forced to show some of its fancier court tricks in turning back a determined University of Idaho team, 34-31, last night.

After a day's rest the Webfoots meet the Cougars tonight and Saturday night at Pullman. Oregon took an easy 43-21 win over the Vandals Tuesday night and now hold a two-game edge on the field in the northern division version of the Pacific Coast conference race.

A revamped Vandal lineup was by no means a pushover last night. They led for the first nine minutes but had dropped behind, 20-14, at the half. In the last half, Idaho crept up again to hold the short side of 28-27 and 30-29 scores for its greatest threats of that period.

Roger Wiley, Oregon center who scored 16 points Tuesday night, was held to a meager six last night, and Idaho's Fred Quinn and R. Ryan each tipped in 10 for high point honors.

Taylor with 9 and Wren with 7 paced Webfoot scoring.

SEATTLE, Jan. 14.—(AP)—By the method of simply ignoring the vaunted passing and ball handling skill of the Harlem Globe Trotters and concentrating on their own speedy and aggressive game, the University of Washington last night overpowered the visiting professional basketball club and won easily, 49 to 30.

DiMaggio, Wife Reconciled; Joe To Quit Baseball

RENO, Nev., Jan. 14.—(AP)—Joe DiMaggio, perhaps the greatest player in the game today, is quitting baseball to join the armed forces.

Back on a love-and-kisses basis with his pretty wife, Dorothy, the New York Yankee batting star, the game's highest paid player, made known he would apply for some branch of the service "as soon as I get a few things straightened out."

Joltin' Joe, son of an Italian fisherman, has been one of the Yankees' top batters since 1935, when he went to the big time from the Pacific Coast league.

Twice Joe has led the American league in batting, twice has been named its most valuable player. In 1940 he led the league in home runs.

With an arm around Mrs. DiMaggio, Joe told newsmen he was enlisting shortly but would return to baseball after the war "if I can still play." He said he hadn't decided yet just what branch of the service he would ask for.

Joe's San Francisco draft board, of course, must grant him permission to enlist, under the new regulations. He is deferred, in class 3-A because of his wife and their young son, Joseph Paul DiMaggio 3rd, 14½ months old.

Mrs. DiMaggio, the former Dorothy Arnold of the radio and screen, had been in Nevada just one day short of the required six weeks residence period for divorce when they called newsmen to the office of their attorney and announced they had patched up their marital differences.



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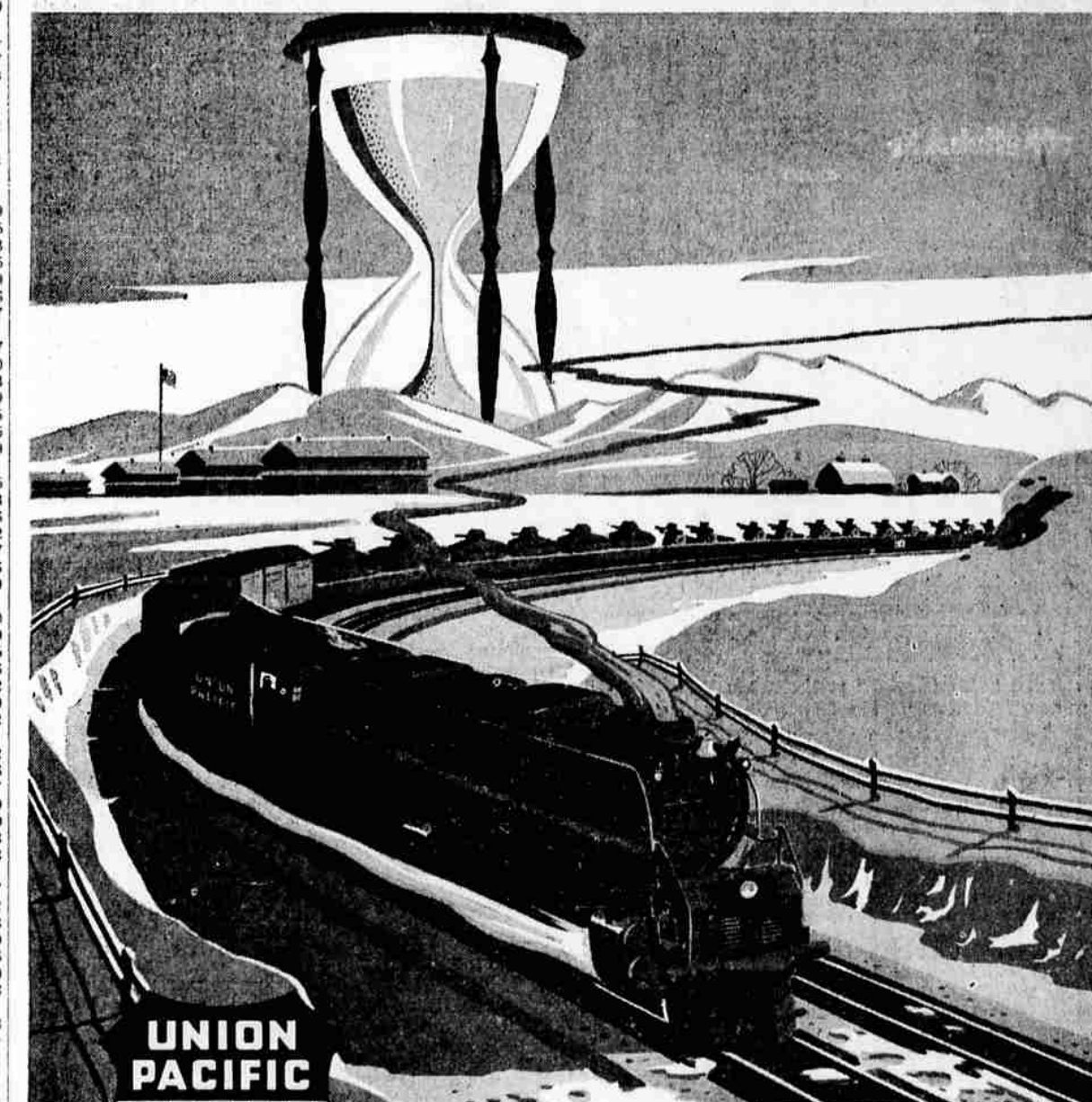
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
