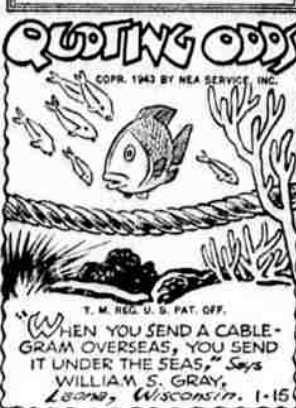

Torpedoman Gets Medal For Bagging Jap Ships

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Jan. 14.—(AP)—Navy Torpedoman James F. Davenport of Newport, R. I., wore the navy and marine corps medal today for his work aboard a submarine which sank three Japanese destroyers off Alaska July 1, 1942.

Capt. Byron McAndrews, acting for President Roosevelt, presented him with the medal yesterday in ceremonies at the destroyer base here. A citation by Admiral C. W. Nimitz, Pacific fleet commander in chief, praised the sailor's heroism and noted that "he rendered invaluable service in leadership."

Davenport described the attack, first announced in a navy communiqué at Washington on July 6, as having taken place "between the Aleutians." "We caught three destroyers sitting like ducks in the bay and sank all of them with four torpedoes. Two of the ships hadn't even hauled up their anchors when they were at sundown."

One destroyer, he said, was able to fire a torpedo at the submarine. The torpedo passed over the coming tower and a moment later one of the ship's torpedoes ripped a hole in the destroyer.

Centenarian Will Cavort On Pair of Ice Skates

SPOKANE, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Warning his hands before a 100-candle cake that would have made heat rationers lift their eyebrows, John Jerome White, centenarian ice skater, yesterday took in stride the gags of the athletic round table at a day-early 100th birthday party in his honor.

The real party and official birthday will be tonight when White, no mean figure skater, will be the featured attraction at an ice carnival at the ice arena.

White apparently plans still to be cavorting on the blades when he reaches 110. He announced yesterday he had just purchased a war bond and planned to live long enough to cash it at matured value.

New Suspects in Darlan Murder Plot Arrested

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Jan. 13.—(AP)—General Giraud, new high commissioner of French north and west Africa, and General Charles DeGaulle, leader of the fighting French, will meet soon, a spokesman for General Giraud said last night as the assassination of Giraud's predecessor, Admiral Darlan, took on new undertones of mystery.

Gen. Giraud's spokesman, disclosing that additional "personages of Algiers" had been arrested in the case and others arrested earlier had been released, said the investigation of Darlan's assassination Christmas eve was being prosecuted "without consideration of the prominence of the persons involved, nor their political beliefs."

The investigation, he said, was being made by military authorities. Asked if the Count of Paris, heading a French monarchist group, had figured in the investigation, the spokesman said he could not discuss the trend of the inquiry.

"The murder of Darlan possibly was political," he said, "but the investigation and trial will be conducted merely as that of a criminal for a crime needing punishment."

A young man described as a Frenchman, whose mother lives in Italy, already has been executed as the actual assassin in the killing of Admiral Darlan.

The new "personages" arrested, it was pointed out, are in addition to the 12 seized New Year's eve as instigators of a plot to kill Robert Murphy, President Roosevelt's personal minister in north Africa, General Giraud and others.

Giraud, disclosing the arrests of the original 12, said that some of them were personal friends and some had assisted in the American occupation of north Africa.

Announcing the forthcoming meeting of Giraud and DeGaulle, who has insisted that former supporters of the Vichy government be removed from their posts in north Africa, Giraud's spokesman said that "many telegrams have been exchanged between Gen. Giraud and Gen. DeGaulle with a view to reaching an agreement."

In London a fighting French spokesman predicted an "early and complete agreement" and said the meeting is expected to take place almost immediately. After the meeting, Gen. DeGaulle will go to Washington to see President Roosevelt, he said.

Snell's Stand On Tax Issue Wins General Approval

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 14.—(AP)—Legislative reaction to Gov. Earl Snell's inaugural address: Rep. Giles French, More republican: "The governor's message had many definite recommendations, probably too many to be consummated at this session. . . . The taxation recommendations were very good. . . ."

Senate President W. H. Steiwer, Fossil republican: "I agree with the principle of the message regarding reduction of property taxes. . . . I had hoped that this might be accomplished and at the same time effect at least a temporary reduction in the income tax. . . ."

Sen. Rex Ellis, Pendleton republican: "The property tax is not bothering us in eastern Oregon. But the state income tax plus the federal income tax has killed the incentive of our large farmers to increase production."

Rep. Earl Hill, Cushman republican: "Snell pulled no punches. There is no question but that property will have to have some relief. But I also favor the reduction of the income tax and elimination of the intangibles tax."

Sen. Dean H. Walker, Independence republican: "I think that Governor Snell's attitude on pensions and caring for post-war problems is typical of his generous nature. . . ."

Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney, Portland democrat: "Governor Snell's message indicates he believes in the redemption of campaign promises. I particularly liked his demand for a minimum \$40 old-age pension in fact as well as in theory. . . ."

Sen. S. H. Zuercher, Enterprise republican: "I think the most important part of the message was the tax proposal. In general, he was on fairly safe ground."
