We're close enough to it that we don't need to paint our faces and beat tom-toms to make ourselves believe it.

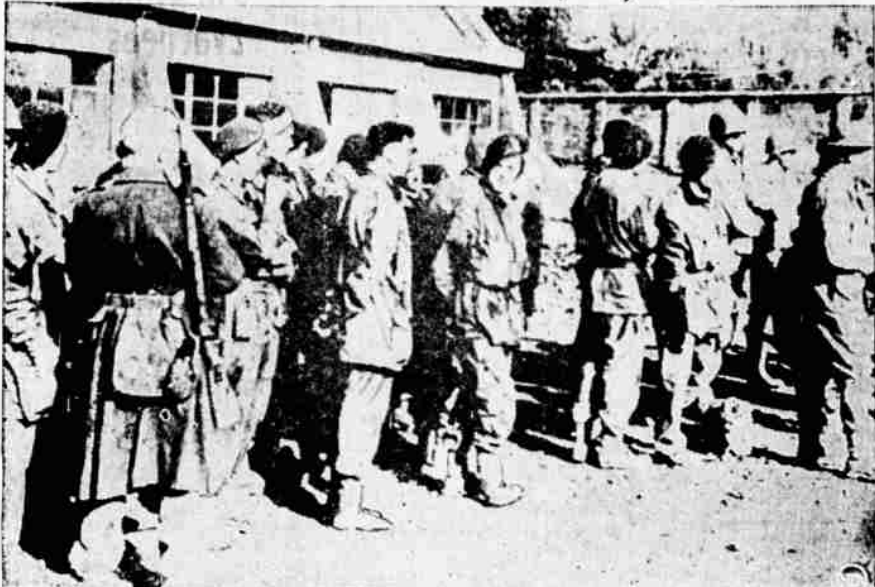

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Small Business Needs Aid to Keep Going, Ickes Says

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Secretary of Interior Ickes yesterday pictured America's small business man as a forlorn loser in the turmoil of war and called for a more diligent effort to keep him on a going basis.

"We can clearly see the trends," Ickes told a special senate committee which concerned itself primarily today with ways to find a place in the war economy for small mine operators, the major portion of war production contracts going to a few large corporations, the hundreds of small businesses closing.

"The fundamental fact and problem that we face," he said, "is that both mineral resources and business talents lie idle. They must be brought together."

While Ickes was expressing his concern over this phase of war-

brought changes in American life, assurances developed that the new congress would tackle the issue of a national retail sales tax.

Rep. Robertson (D., Va.) announced he would re-offer this method of raising revenue toward the goal of \$16,000,000,000 new income proposed by President in his budget message. A similar tax plan died last session but its supporters believe it will command more support now.

Cummings Lost To RHS In Tilt Against Coos Five

The Roseburg high school Indians, who meet Marshfield here Saturday night in a non-conference basketball game, will be without the services of Ward Cummings guard, who in last Saturday night's contest snatched a one-point victory by his last second basket. Cummings is absent from school because of illness and is not expected to be able to play in the game tomorrow night.

Jim Ward will probably get the starting call in place of Cummings. Ward was one of the high scorers when the Indians invaded the Coos bay area in early season games, but in the two games played on the home court failed to show the ability of which he is capable. His failure might have been due to the fact that he sat too long on the bench before getting into the game and a starting assignment may result in the relaxation needed for accurate basket tossing. Ward last season was the ace player of the Days Creek team and was one of the outstanding B league scorers.

Aside from the loss of Cummings, the Indians are expected to be at full strength in meeting the Marshfield team tomorrow night and have had the benefit of two tough contests against the strong Medford squad, plus an opportunity to study the team weaknesses as developed in those games.

Don't Use Gas Ration Too Fast, Motorists Told

Holders of gasoline ration books who use their allotments before the expiration of the period of validity will get no ration relief, the state OPA warns.

Some holders of supplemental books are using their rations too fast to spread over the entire period, OPA reported. Special concern was expressed because of reports that some war workers were using their quotas too fast. Labor-management committees in many war plants are cooperating by urging workers to budget themselves in the use of gasoline so their allotments will stretch over the entire period.

Persons misusing their supplemental rations will not be given any consideration for additional rations irrespective of the type of employment in which they might be engaged, according to the state OPA. However, it was pointed out, that this does not apply to cases where the ration was not sufficient to take care of eligible requirements.

Supplemental book holders who cannot justify their use of mileage for the travel purpose for which it was issued are liable for revocation of their ration books, it was stated. The OPA also re-

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3 Feudists Die In Electric Chair

COLUMBIA, S. C., Jan. 15.—(AP)—The tangled threads of an Edgemoor county feud that caused five violent deaths were cut today as the state took the lives of two men and, for the first time, electrocuted a woman—all convicted of murder.

Mrs. Sue Logue, 43-year-old former school teacher, was the first to die. She was convicted along with her brother-in-law, George Logue, 55, and Clarence Bagwell, 34, of planning the murder of a neighbor, Davis W. Timmerman.

Mrs. Logue was led to the chair shortly after 6 a. m. she appeared ashen but calm, and when the captain of the guards, C. A. Sullivan, asked her if she had anything to say, she replied:

"No sir, I'm ready to die." Bagwell, the last to go, brought to eight the number of deaths that grew out of a feud-line quarrel between Timmerman and the Logues. George Logue was pronounced dead in the chair at 6:32.
