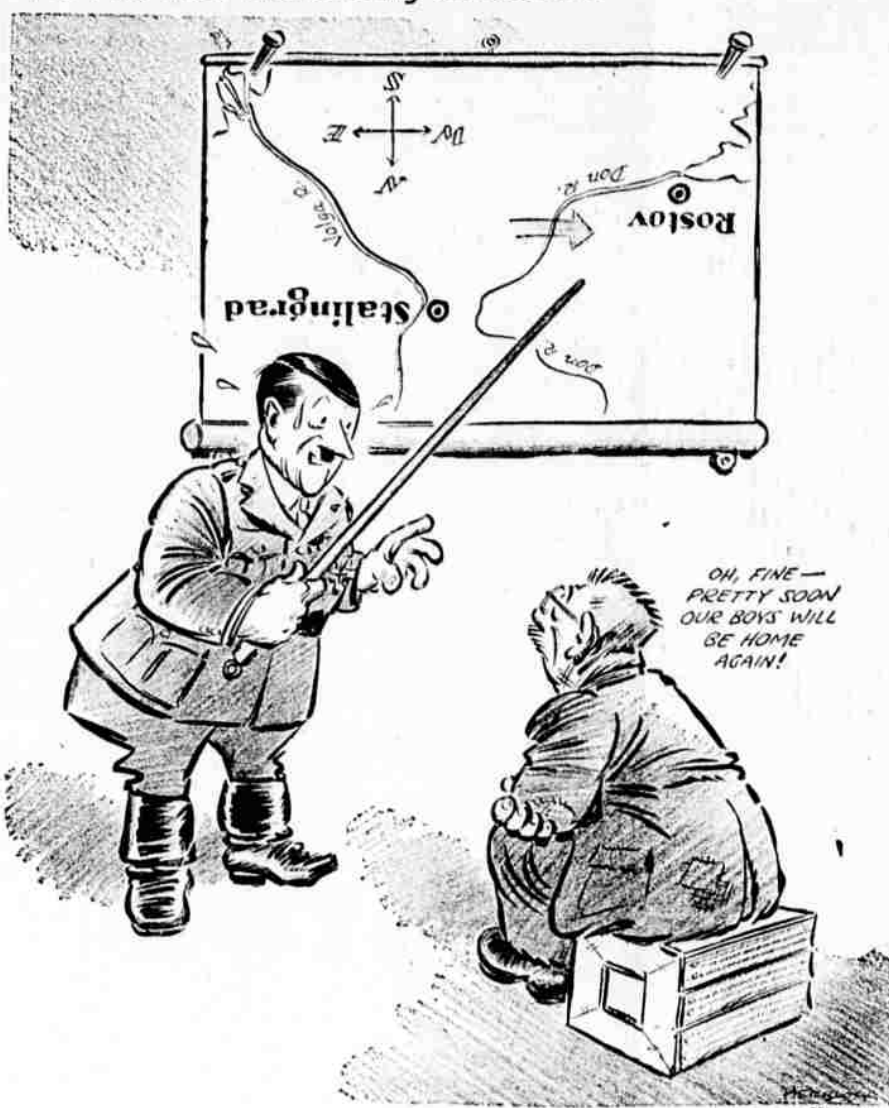
LOUISE CAMPBELL CIRCLE TO MEET ON WEDNESDAY

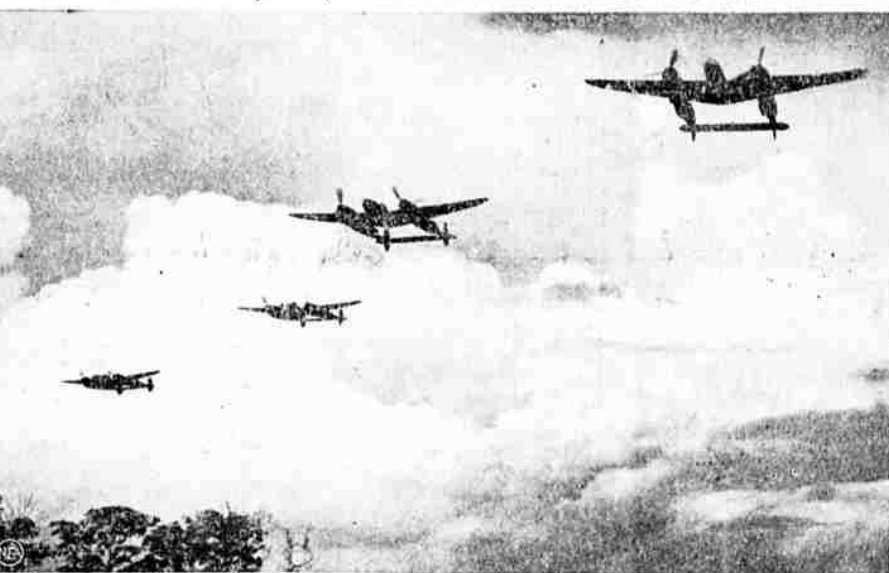
Funeral of Oberman Baby Held at Oakland

Mechanic Learner Training Open to More Applicants

James Bartley, owner-manager of Bartley's Repair and Machine shop here, who has been serving for the past few months as an instructor at the Eugene vocational school, is spending the weekend at his home here. Mr. Bartley reports that a new class is being organized in the mechanic

learner training program and applications are now being accepted. The purpose of the program is to give actual army air forces supervised training to applicants to fit them for employment as civil service workers at army air forces depots as aircraft maintenance workers.

Mr. Bartley will be in Roseburg until 4 p. m. Tuesday and will be glad, he reports, to supply detailed information to any eligible persons desiring to register for the course, which is open to women over the age of 16 years, or to men from 16 to 17 years of age or over the age of 38 years, or in 4-F draft classification. The course, Mr. Bartley states, offers an opportunity for war work to persons who are physically handicapped and therefore rejected for military service, but who are able to do mechanical work.
