Harvest Work by Women, Children Must be Greater

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 18 (AP)—Women and children, who harvested more than 60 per cent of Oregon's seasonal farm crops last year, will have to do even more during 1943, officials of the U. S. employment service told the state agricultural advisory committee here.

During the 1942 harvest season, only 35,548 of the 93,373 farm placements were men over 18, while there were 39,150 women placed on farms.

Only 10 per cent of the harvest workers came from outside of the state, while more than two-thirds were from communities near the harvest areas.

L. C. Stoll, area director for the war manpower commission, said the letdown in cantonment construction and a drop in labor demands by shipyards might help farmers in getting experienced farm machine men.

Stoll urged the farmers to plant all the essential crops they can, assuring them they would have the labor to harvest them.

The conferees agreed that a publicity and advertising campaign must be held to educate the public that a farm boy who doesn't go to war is not a slacker; there must be more adequate training of children for harvest work; wholesome surroundings in harvest fields must be provided for children; and drunkenness

and other forms of absenteeism, which caused some loss of man-hours in harvest fields last season, must be curbed.

W. K. Hopkins, Los Angeles, regional director of the war manpower commission, said at the meeting that Oregon did the best job in the nation in harvesting its 1942 crops.

"One of the reasons for Oregon's agricultural record," Hopkins said, "lies in the fact that the state leaders have recognized that the state-wide farm problems can be solved only by their own initiative and enterprise."

Lowered Quality Means Ultimate Dairy Troubles

Dairy products manufacturers who allow quality of their output to slip during wartime are laying up trouble for themselves and the whole industry after peace comes, warns Dr. G. H. Wilster, head of dairy manufacturing work at Oregon State college. Results of the latest quarterly butter grading and analysis service scoring showed a reduction in average quality of the 46 samples submitted, which he termed unsatisfactory.

"These are difficult times and problems are many," wrote Dr. Wilster in connection with his report on the confidential scoring. "All creameries are operating under high pressure and they are short of skilled personnel. Nevertheless, it is highly important that dairy products of high quality and of uniform composition be made even under these difficult conditions. The Oregon butter industry must prepare itself to meet marketing problems after the conclusion of the war. The best way to meet the competition of so-called substitutes is with butter that has a fine flavor, that has a waxy body and spreads well, that contains the right amount of salt, and that has a pleasing color."

The usual dairy products short course and annual convention of the Oregon Dairy Manufacturers' association held at Oregon State college has been changed this year to a one-day convention of the O. D. M. A. to be held in Portland February 18.

Unshelled Nuts Upped In Marketing Quota

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 18 (AP)—Ninety per cent of the 1942 crop of merchantable walnuts produced in California, Oregon and Washington may be sold unshelled in domestic markets, the department of agriculture announced.

Previously the salable percentage has been set at 80.

The San Francisco office of the department said the secretary of agriculture approved the increase to better the ratio of supplies to demand. Walnut production is smaller than was previously estimated and demand is greater than had been anticipated, the announcement said.

The merchantable walnuts which are withheld from sale as unshelled nuts will be shelled or exported.
