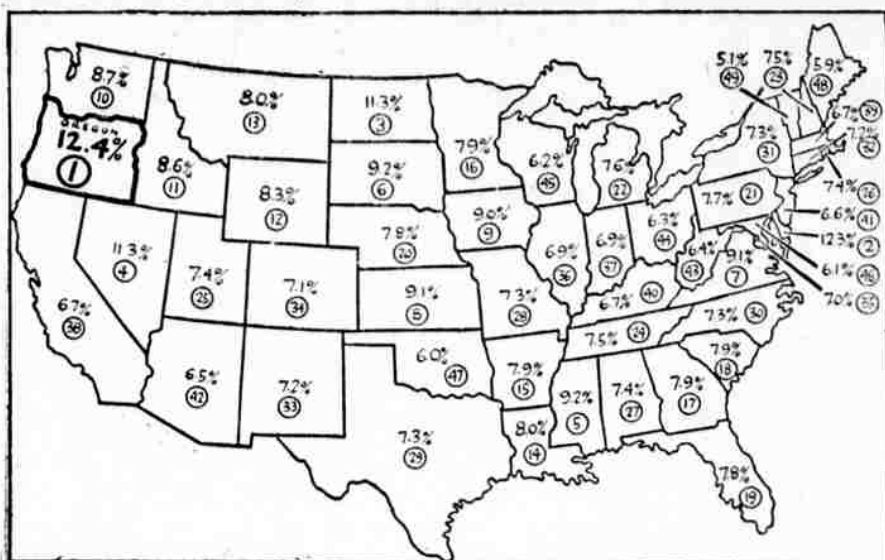

Oregon Again Tops U. S. in War Bond Sales



Oregon again leads the U. S. A. in war bond sales and Douglas county did its part by purchasing \$311,108.75 of war bonds during November, the last month for which official figures are available. Total state wide sales equaled \$10,787,000. Oregon's national record is the largest purchase of war bonds in proportion to income of any state in the union. \$9.93 out of every \$100 of income was loaned to the government to provide equipment for the boys on the fighting fronts. Oregon has led the nation twice in the last four months, having also been number one state in August. The state's quota for January is \$10,300,000, which is \$2,200,000 higher than previously. The quota for Douglas county is \$130,810. The limit purchase for husband and wife or any owner and co-owner has been raised from \$5000 to \$10,000 in any one year.

Bungling Partly Blamed For Food Shortages

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—(AP)—M. Clifford Townsend, food production administrator, today told the senate defense investigating committee, that he feared there was "no chance" of meeting 1943 production goals without an increase in the war production board's allotments for new farm machinery.

The food distribution question was highlighted in testimony by Rose Marie Kiefer, secretary-manager of the Grocers' association, that "hundreds of communities" have already been for weeks without adequate supplies of meat and dairy products.

She told the senate small business committee these shortages were induced "in part, at least, by bureaucratic bungling and a refusal on the part of the office of price administration to accept as a working principle that nei-

Grants Pass remained in a tie with Roseburg for first place by trimming the Medford Pear Pickers 32 to 26 Friday night, but Medford finally broke into the win column Saturday with a 27 to 17 win over Ashland. Ashland was beaten 27 to 24 a week previously by Grants Pass. In a non-conference game Saturday Grants Pass was beaten by Klamath Falls, 32 to 28. Ashland plays at Grants Pass tonight in the only mid-week conference clash. Roseburg plays at Ashland Friday and Saturday nights and Medford travels to Grants Pass Friday night.

Killer of Mother Fails In Conviction Appeal

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 19.—(AP)—Clarence Nordin, Portland, convicted of manslaughter for the shooting of his aged mother, Mary Nordin, lost his appeal to the state supreme court today. Nordin admitted he shot and killed his mother with a rifle, but he claimed the gun was discharged accidentally when he was cleaning it. In his appeal, he contended he was convicted on purely circumstantial evidence, and that the lower court should have directed the jury to acquit him.

The slaying occurred March 3, 1942.

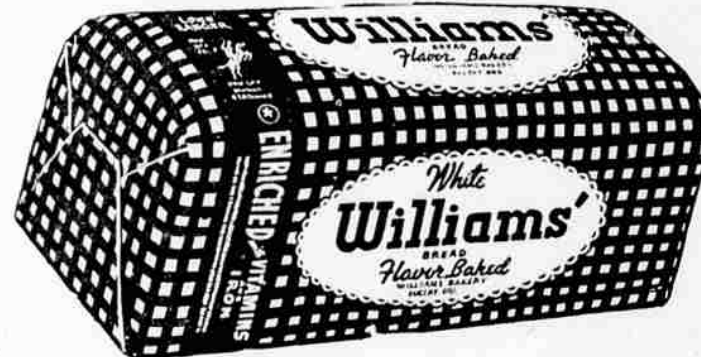
