OSC Hoopsters Defeat Huskies

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 20.—(AP)—A tight man-for-man second half defense and the deft under-the-basket work of a 6-foot 4 inch sophomore center gave the Oregon State basketball team a clean-cut 42 to 39 victory over the visiting Huskies of the University of Washington last night.

Center Erlend Anderson put his club out in front midway in the first half and for the rest of the way the defending Pacific Coast conference champions put up a sound defense that forced the Huskies to shoot from far out. Anderson got 15 points, 12 of them in the first half.

Early in the game the score was tied five times. After the count reached 13-13 however, Anderson scored four successive baskets to give the Beavers a lead of 27-20, which they maintained at half time.

The Huskies closed fast on a foul conversion by Center Gilmer and two quick field goals by Boody Gilbertson, bringing the count to 42-39. But the Washington shooters were unable to close the gap, although they had possession of the ball three times in the final minute. Bobby Morris, guard, was high scorer for Washington with 13 points.

Kiwanis Visitor Urges Strong War Leadership

Clyde Perkins, a visiting Kiwanian from Vancouver, Wash., spoke before the Roseburg Kiwanis club at the regular Tuesday luncheon program, of the need for strong leadership to guide the nations of the world following the current war. He stressed the need for men in public positions who are imbued with the love of liberty and the high ideals exemplified in George Washington, who was cited as an example of the type of leader needed at the present time.

The club voted endorsement of the "penny milk" program being instituted in the Roseburg schools, following presentation of the plan by W. M. Campbell, city school superintendent, and the club agreed to finance the program, under which all children in elementary schools will be provided with a half-pint of milk daily upon payment of one cent. The difference in cost will be paid jointly by the Kiwanis club and the U. S. department of agriculture.

F. W. Woolley, Former Roseburg Merchant, Passes

Frank W. Woolley, former Roseburg hardware merchant, died last Sunday in Portland, Oregon, at the age of 80. He was a member of the old firm of Churchill, Woolley and MacKenzie, predecessor of the present Churchill Hardware Co. After moving from this city, he engaged in business elsewhere in the state, served for a time as city manager of Warrenton, Oregon, and finally located in Portland, engaging in the insurance business.

Born in Taylor's Falls, Minn., Mr. Woolley came to Oregon in 1888 and was married to Lottie Berry in 1891. They celebrated their golden wedding two years ago. Mr. Woolley is survived by his widow; two daughters, Mrs. Ruth Laws, Salem, and Mrs. Charlotte Large, Portland; three sons, Dr. Ivan M. and Dr. Kenneth C., both of Portland, and Alan C., of Chicago; nine grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

The funeral was held in Portland today.
