Myrtle Creek Five Beats Canyonville In Hot Tilt, 32-30

Myrtle Creek high school's Vikings, who for several years have been one of the outstanding basketball teams of the country, had a narrow escape Wednesday night when they nipped Canyonville by two points in the last 40 seconds of a wild basketball game played at Canyonville. The score was 32 to 30.

The Vikings took a good lead in the early part of the game, but were unable to halt a rally in the second half by the strongest team to represent Canyonville since that school entered the B league three years ago. The score was tied with 40 seconds to go, but Myrtle Creek broke the tie and won the game when a last second toss by a Canyonville player rolled off the rim of the basket.

Myrtle Creek had a lead of 10 to 8 at the quarter and 20 to 14 at the half. During the third period, Canyonville crawled up to within one point of the Vikings and the game went into the last quarter with Myrtle Creek ahead 24 to 23. With only 40 seconds left in the game Canyonville tied the score and in the desperate melee which followed, Newton edged two points for Myrtle Creek with a 30-foot howitzer shot. Canyonville rushed the ball down court and took a long shot at the basket just as the game ended, but the ball bounced off the rim to give the Vikings their victory.

and Grants Pass, so that no service was available from either the north or south.
The California Oregon Power company reported that the power line between Roseburg and Eugene was broken Wednesday, but service was restored early this morning. Power was supplied the Roseburg area, but could not be fed to the Eugene system, which was forced to draw energy from the north. A break in the line between Oakland and Sutherlin occurred last night, but was repaired during the night. A break also occurred on the Weaver road section of the line supplying Riddle and Canyonville, causing a black out in those sections temporarily. Both were caused by falling trees. Service in the Roseburg area was interrupted several times, when

falling branches or snow slides short-circuited the main transmission lines and caused the automatic switches to open the circuit.

Flood Waters Receding

The storm brought flood waters for the third time in as many months, although the high water did not reach the maximum experienced earlier. The South Umpqua river was receding today, after reaching the 17-foot stage at the city's sewage disposal plant. The previous high mark was 21 feet. The North Umpqua river was reported to be rising today, but was not expected to reach a dangerous stage.

Reports from the northern part of the state indicated a storm of far greater intensity than was felt in the Umpqua valley, as Portland experienced a blizzard driven by a high wind. Schools were closed and work at shipyards was curtailed. In the southern part of the state the principal damage was from flood waters, reported today to be receding.

Physician to Edison Dies by His Own Hand

ORANGE, N. J., Jan. 22.—Dr. John Hammond Bradshaw, 82, one of New Jersey's most prominent surgeons, was found dead Wednesday in his office and the medical examiner's report listed his death as suicide by inhaling illuminating gas.

Dr. Bradshaw, who was personal physician to the late Thomas A. Edison and members of the Edison family for 40 years, had been ill several months.

Rates on Long Distance Phone Calls to Be Cut

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—The American Telephone & Telegraph company has agreed to reduce rates on long distance calls of more than three minutes and cut charges for leased wire service to save the public some \$34,700,000 a year.

Besides the saving to the public, the agreement will cut the long lines department's revenue by an additional \$21,000,000 in increased shares to connecting companies.

Draft for Navy, Marines, Coast Guard Due Soon

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—National headquarters of selective service expects to be able to begin filling the manpower needs of all the armed forces through draft machinery around February 1, responsible officials said.

A final draft of a plan through which needs of the navy, marine corps and coast guard, will be filled through selective service now is being checked by the war and navy departments.

President Roosevelt, in his December 5 manpower order, ended voluntary enlistments in the sea-going forces of men aged 18 and 37 and ordered that men in those age groups henceforth be obtained through draft boards.

Under the plan, as finally drafted by selective service, single induction centers will be established and selective service staffs at those centers will be bolstered by recruiting officers, who will take over the additional work resulting from the new procedure.

Men called for induction will be given an opportunity to express a choice among the army, navy, marine corps and coast guard. Their preference will be honored provided they meet the qualifications of the arm chosen and the quota of their draft board for that arm has not been filled.
