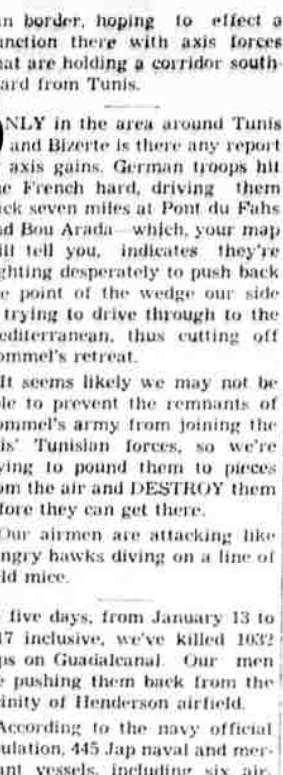

CONCERNING THE NORTHWEST

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 23. Aside from commercial dealers and a few thousand farmers in the northwest, there is almost total ignorance of a crop that is growing in size and value with every year. This is the production of cover-crop seed. In 1942, according to estimates by Triple A, production in Oregon and Washington amounted to 225,320,000 pounds. Two years earlier production for the region was less than half that amount and most of this was in the Willamette valley.

ROUGHLY, the 1942 seeds brought \$13,500,000 to the farmers. It is expected that this year the yield will fetch \$19,000,000. Compare that sum with the salmon industry in the northwest, or the pears or apples. Several counties in Washington and Oregon have specialized in wheat, but many farmers have turned to cover crop seed and their profits will equal and in certain instances surpass the income from growing wheat.

ONE federal agency writes to a concern with facilities to manufacture industrial alcohol that "lack of market is the chief disadvantage of manufacturing on the west coast" and that tank car shortage would prevent the product being shipped east.

MEMBERS of the legislatures of Washington and Oregon may as well save their breath as argue about memorials to congress, which are brought up at every session. A legislative memorial, when it is adopted and forwarded to the vice president and the speaker of the house, receives a line in the Congressional Record and is "referred to the proper committee," which means that thereafter nothing is done with the memorial. It may be hot stuff when it is passed in the senate, but it receives nothing more than an acknowledgment from congress, which has its own troubles.

AN investigation is proposed of the relocation centers to which the Japanese were moved from their farms, stores and offices. One charge is that they are favored with rationed food when nearby settlers must struggle with the grocers; another assertion is that the men in charge (American) are of the starchy-eyed group who wish to be as easy as possible with the enemy. Sentiment for the investigation has been increased by recent riotous incidents at certain western centers.

CRITICS who complain about the tremendous expenditures in this war are constantly comparing the present outlay with the costs of world war No. 1. Well, the first war cost approximately 26 billion dollars; the present war has spent or has obligated 35 billion dollars just for the air force alone. The original air force was insignificant and was part of the signal corps; today there are tens of thousands of planes; innumerable planes, air bases, and landing fields. According to the president's figures, based on December production, planes are produced at the rate of 135 a day.
