Husky Hoopsters Beat Oregon; Idaho Loses to Cougars

(By the Associated Press)

The University of Washington and Washington State college basketball teams moved into a tie for first place in the northern division Pacific Coast conference race last night, defeating the University of Oregon, 52 to 48, and University of Idaho, 54-46, respectively.

The victories gave the two leaders two wins and one loss in the conference race, dropping Oregon to second, the defending champions, Oregon State, to third and Idaho to fourth.

At Eugene, the Washington Speed Merchants dropped behind after the first 10 minutes, were down 25-31 at the half and had to come from behind in the last nine minutes to chalk up their victory.

Center Chuck Gilmur, Husky center who led his mates in the scoring columns with 20 points, finally flipped in the basket that put Washington in the lead for keeps, a 42-41 margin, which the visitors built up to 50-44 with 31 minutes to go.

Center Ralph Fuhrman led the Oregon attack with 14 points. The teams met again tonight. At Moscow, Washington State led most of the way, holding a 28-22 edge at the intermission, but they looked ragged in the first as the advantage saw sawed back and forth.

In the second half, though, the Cougars got under way and continued to increase their lead despite Idaho spurts. Forward Gail Bishop led the W. S. C. drive with 66 points while Guard Jack Ryan was high with 15 for Idaho.

RHS Hoopsters Lose to Ashland By Score of 36-29

The Roseburg senior high school Indians lost their first conference basketball game of the season last night when they were beaten 36 to 29 at Ashland. It was Ashland's first victory in the southern Oregon league.

The contest was played under difficult circumstances, as the gymnasium lighting system failed midway in the game and the contest was finished under emergency lights which provided only partial illumination. The Indians also were handicapped by the fact that they delayed the start of their trip until after noon Friday and had not fully recovered from the effects of the long ride at the time they went on the floor, their game not being up to the usual standard.

The two teams met again tonight, at which time it is hoped to have the lights in better shape. The first half of last night's game was played on even terms with the score tied at 8-8 at the quarters and 16-16 at half-time. Ashland, however, went into the lead, 26-20 in the third period. Anderson, who substituted for Loomis at forward, proved Roseburg's outstanding player.

PORTLAND, Jan. 23 — (AP)—The broken tanker Schenectady, which sank mysteriously Saturday night, will go to sea after all.

Workmen cut the 16,500-ton ship in two and hauled one section to a drydock for rejoining. The sinking still was unexplained. The ship's plates buckled amidship while the tanker was tied up at an outfitting dock at the new Henry J. Kaiser Swan Island shipyard, and the ship plunged to the bottom of the Willamette river.
