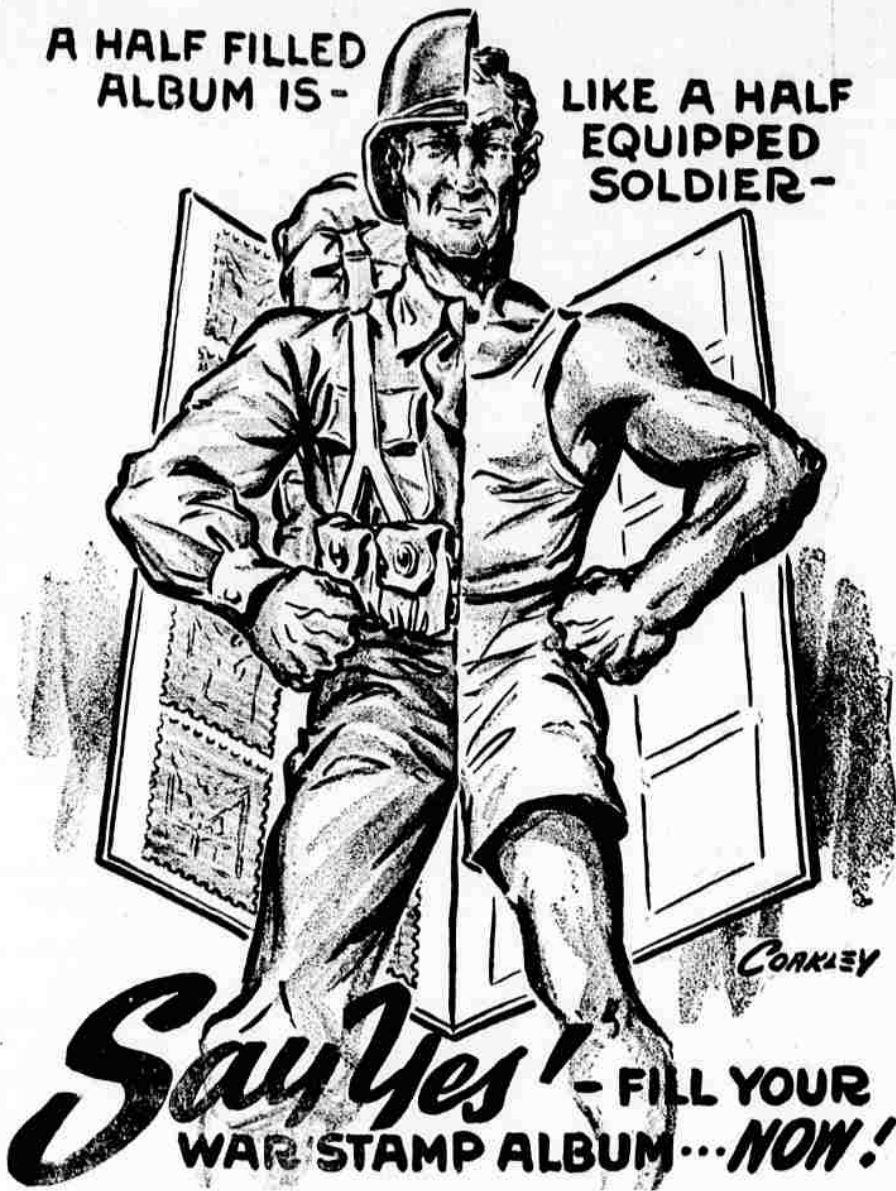

H. Worthington, City Electrical Inspector, Dies

Henry Worthington, 62, city electrical inspector, died at his home in Roseburg early this morning following a long period of ill health.

Born in Illinois in October, 1880, he had spent his active life engaged in electrical work, being employed with the California Oregon Power company since September, 1918, as a service man, while previously he had been employed as a lineman and service man with the former ownership. He served for many years as electrical inspector for the city of Roseburg. He was a son of the late Grafton Worthington, a contractor and a city councilman for a number of years.

Mr. Worthington is survived by his widow, Ora Worthington.

The body has been removed to the Roseburg Undertaking company parlors. Arrangements for funeral services have not been made.

Thaw Snarls Portland Traffic, Shuts Schools

PORTLAND, Jan. 26—(AP)—The dread silver thaw gripped Portland today, snarling transportation systems and closing schools again.

Rain, snow and sleet fell intermittently last night. In many sections of the city it froze as it hit, and a sheathing of ice covered trees, homes and streets.

Schools, which had reopened for one day after a three-day closure because of cold and a heavy snowfall, were ordered closed again.

East of the city snow drifted, blocking several minor roads. Automobiles also were stalled on the Columbia river highway near Crown point. A plow sent from The Dalles to clear the route broke down at Mitchell point.

Dan Egly, Ex-Resident Of Roseburg, Passes On

Word has been received here telling of the death of Dan Egly, 79, Friday, January 22, at Blackfoot, Idaho. The Egly family resided in Roseburg for a number of years and later made their home at Melrose until a little over a year ago, when they moved to Blackfoot. Mr. Egly had been in poor health for some time. His body is being shipped to their former home town in Nebraska. He is survived by his widow, a son in Nebraska, and two daughters, one at Blackfoot, the other at Pocatello, Idaho.

Parkin apparently had been dead three days, Sewell said. The body was found by relatives who went to the ranch for a visit.

Two Soldiers Killed In Collision of Trains

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif., Jan. 26—(AP)—The rear-end collision of two westbound Santa Fe trains in the mouth of Cajon pass, four miles north of here, caused the death of two soldiers and injured 14 other persons, some of them passengers, late last night.

Santa Fe officials said the locomotive of the 14-car Grand Canyon Limited, which left Chicago Jan. 23, crashed into a freight train's caboose, demolishing it and derailed four or five boxcars. Names of the soldiers killed were withheld by army authorities until relatives have been notified.

Butter Price Increase On West Coast Urged

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 26—(AP)—Recommendations for a three-cent increase in the Pacific coast butter price over that of the Chicago market were voiced yesterday at a meeting of 200 delegates attending the Pacific States Butter, Egg, Cheese and Poultry association.

Ray Miller of Seattle, chairman of the butter committee of the organization, reported his group is drafting a resolution to that effect, to be forwarded to Washington in an effort to enable the west coast to get more butter.

Need for a permanent ceiling on egg prices also was voiced.

Canary's Death Causes Child to Kill Himself

SODUS, N. Y., Jan. 26—(AP)—Grieving over the death of her yellow canary, 13-year-old Jennie Lewis took her own life with a shotgun.

A stray cat killed the bird as it fluttered after Jennie when she stepped outside her farm home near this Wayne county community.

The girl left a note for her mother expressing sorrow for the loss and then shot herself, Coroner Arthur Besemer reported last night.

Wood Rationing in Oregon Not Needed

PORTLAND, Jan. 26—(AP)—David Eccles, Oregon deputy solid fuels coordinator, said today rationing of wood in this area is unnecessary.

On Washington reports that a wood rationing plan would be invoked in 32 Oregon and Washington cities, he commented: "It is ill-advised and unnecessary."

Eccles said his office had not been informed of the OPA plan, as reported from Washington, nor had it been consulted recently on the desirability of rationing.

OPA has sent fuel experts here from time to time to investigate the wood fuel situation, Eccles said, describing one of them as a "former oil man from Boston who didn't know what hogged fuel was."

E. H. Dewey, Mining Man, Railroad Builder, Dies

NAMPA, Idaho, Jan. 26—(AP)—E. H. Dewey, 73, prominent southwestern Idaho mining man, railroad builder and financier, died yesterday.

He was a son of Col. W. H. Dewey, early day Owyhee county mining magnate and builder of Nampa's Dewey Palace hotel.

E. H. Dewey, a native of Idaho, was instrumental in developing many of the mining properties of the Silver City area, including the famous Trade Dollar mine, in which the Mellon family of Pittsburgh was financially interested.

With his father he built railroads from Nampa to Murphy, Nampa to Emmett and Nampa to McCall.

K. of P. Diverts Fund To Paralysis Drive

Members of the Knights of Pythias lodge voted last night to contribute their prize fund to the infantile paralysis foundation, the donation amounting to \$6. The money raised by membership contributions at each meeting ordinarily is invested in war stamps to be distributed as prizes. Last night's meeting was followed by a rabbit feed and social hour.
