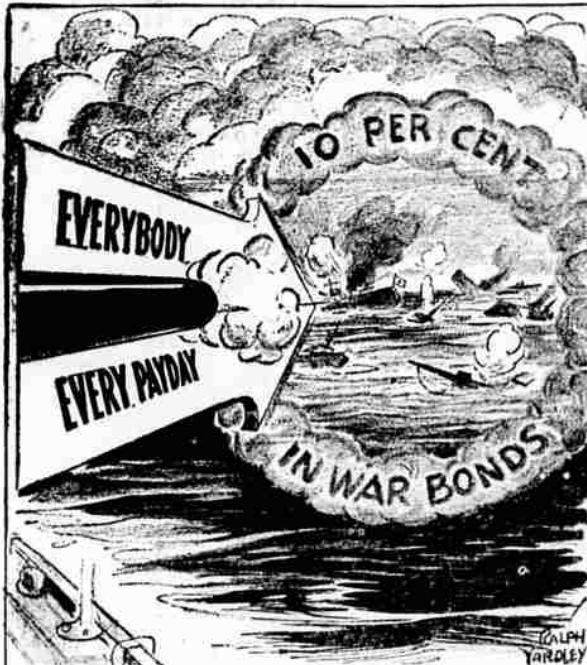

Henry F. Worthington Funeral Is Arranged

Funeral services will be conducted at the Roseburg Undertaking company chapel at 2 p. m. Thursday for Henry F. Worthington, 62, city electrical inspector, who died Tuesday at Mercy hospital.

Born in Savanna, Ill., Oct. 10, 1880, he came to Douglas county with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Grafton Worthington, at the age of nine years, and made his home here continuously for 53 years. He had been employed for 25 years lacking only seven months, with the California Oregon Power company.

Surviving are his wife, Ora May Worthington, and the following brothers and sisters: J. A. Worthington, Canyonville; Victor Worthington, Nampa, Idaho; Ida Burroughs, Boise, Idaho; Grace Schroeder, Canton, Ohio, and Eva Mae Worthington, Roseburg.

The funeral service will be conducted by the Rev. Len B. Fishback and will be concluded in the Masonic cemetery.

Curtis Steirwalt Dies In Eugene; Funeral Here

Curtis M. Steirwalt, 76, former Roseburg resident, died at Eugene this morning. Born Sept. 2, 1866, he came to Roseburg in 1913 and was a continuous resident here until October when he moved to Eugene.

Surviving are his wife, a son, Earl Steirwalt, Lewiston, Idaho, and a daughter, Mrs. Mable Kirschman, Eugene.

The body is being brought to Roseburg and funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Saturday at the Roseburg Undertaking company parlors, conducted by the Rev. Adolph Johnson. Interment will follow in the Civil Bend cemetery.

Basic Work Week Of 54 Hours Is Wool Assn. Urge

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 27—(AP)—The National Wool Growers association, terming the 40-hour work week "totally inapplicable to the present situation," called for increased hours of labor and advocated reduction in governmental civilian employment.

The 40-hour week, the association said in a resolution adopted yesterday at its annual convention, "was originally intended to spread employment" but now "prevents full utilization of manpower."

A 54-hour basic work week was proposed.

Urging a reduction by one-third in the number of civilian employees of governmental units, the association observed:

"The combined number of federal and local government civil servants is almost equal to the number of men in the armed services."

The association criticized the Wagner labor relations law which it described as "the main factor concerned in holding back the industrial and moral recovery of America."

The convention adopted a resolution urging increases in ceiling prices for wool and recommended a monthly survey of wool inventories to serve as a basis for allotting the fiber for civilian use.

Extension of legislation granting the president power to negotiate reciprocal trade agreements was opposed, "unless, in the judgment of congress, some compelling reason exists which has not as yet been made public."

Ceiling Prices Cut On Anti-Freeze Substitutes

PORTLAND, Jan. 27—(AP)—The state OPA announced today that maximum prices on anti-freeze substitutes have been reduced.

Prices of the salt base solutions have been brought down from levels as high as \$2.65 a gallon to 75 and 85 cents, the OPA said. The solutions made from naphtha and kerosene which had sold for as high as \$1.50 a gallon, were reduced to 35 and 43 cents.

The OPA ruled that these petroleum distillates must be plainly labeled and carry a warning that the solution may cause the motor to overheat and melt rubber connections.

The annual Boy Scout council dinner will be held at the Umpqua hotel at 6:45 p. m. Friday and will be open to all persons interested in Scout activities and organization. Fathers, mothers and sons are particularly invited to be present.

K. A. Wells, Scout executive, is to be principal speaker. There will be a motion picture short, dealing with the work of the Boy Scouts in England and showing their participation in civilian defense and other war efforts. Local scouts will give a demonstration and will present a skit entitled, "The Examiner."

2nd Lieut. Harry Black On War Prisoner List

Second Lieutenant Harry B. Black, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. S. Black, 520 Douglas street, Roseburg, was officially included as a prisoner of war today in an announcement by the war department listing the officers and men held by the Japanese in the Philippine islands and Formosa. The parents were given official notification some time ago.

The list released by the war department today includes 11 Oregonians among 459 American soldiers, of which 327 are officers and 129 are enlisted men, together with three officers of the army nursing corps.

Nazis Will Mobilize All Youths 15 to 19

BERN, Jan. 27—(AP)—The Berlin correspondent of an Italian newspaper at Milan reported today that Nazi authorities will mobilize all boys from 15 to 19 years old.

The correspondent said the boys will be assigned tasks of secondary importance to release older soldiers for combat service.

Price Differentials On Produce Demanded

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 27—(AP)—The Pacific States butter, egg, cheese & poultry association, closing its annual meeting here, demanded price differentials over eastern markets amounting to a cent a pound on poultry and 3 cents a pound on butter.

Stabilization of egg prices likewise was requested in a resolution adopted yesterday by the association, which embraces Pacific states and Utah, Idaho and Montana. A half-cent differential already is operative on poultry.

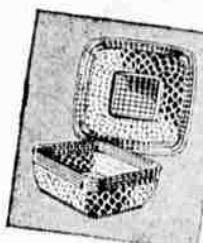
