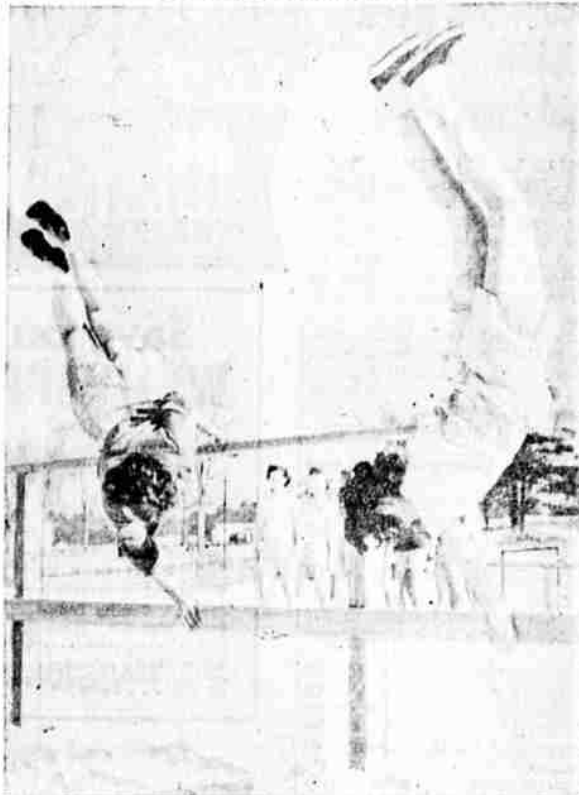
PAST PRESIDENTS CLUB TO MEET ON FRIDAY

American Legion Auxiliary Activities

"As we start on the Americanism program, which was founded at the close of the first world war, let us rededicate ourselves to serve mankind with an even greater determination, in the midst of another world war. Conning Industry Hit By U. S. Indictment

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27 (AP)—The justice department announced yesterday that a federal grand jury at Fort Smith, Ark., had indicted the Ozark Cannery association, Inc., of Fayetteville, Ark., three can manufacturers, five cannery supplies, ten canneries and 175 persons on charge of violating the anti-trust act in the purchase and sale of tomatoes in Arkansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Kansas.

The indictment charged, the department said, that the defendants fixed arbitrary and non-competitive prices on canned tomatoes in the so-called "Ozark area," which supplies from 20 to 25 per cent of the tomatoes grown in the United States.

Frances Farmer's Plight Blamed On Degraded Roles

SEATTLE, Jan. 27—(AP)—Actress Frances Farmer is "just suffering from nervous exhaustion," her mother, Mrs. Lillian Farmer, declared here yesterday on her return from a hurried trip to see her daughter in Hollywood.

Mrs. Farmer said in an interview that "consistently being cast as a professional harlot in pictures has been the principal cause of an acute case of nervous exhaustion."

The actress caused an uproar 10 days ago by battling a police man in a fight which followed her police court hearing for probation violation in a drunken driving case. She was ordered to a convalescent home after a sanity hearing.

"She'll be there six months," Mrs. Farmer said. "And when she gets out there will be no more of those miserable roles. Everyone familiar with acting knows that Frances shouldn't be cast in the kind of pictures she's been given."

"There was one called 'South of Pago Pago.' Frances said, 'Mamma, when I saw myself in that I felt contaminated and degraded.'"
