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JOIN Red Cross Notes

A lot has been said about first aid but we believe the following first aid emphasizes the importance of first aid training most emphatically:

"Second only to Nevada in the number of Red Cross first aiders trained since October, 1933, the State of Oregon today took a bow in a year-end report of A. L. Schafer, Pacific area manager of the American Red Cross. "Eighty-four in every thousand citizens of Oregon," Schafer said, "carry certificates showing them to be trained graduates of the Red Cross standard, advanced or instructor's first aid course. This is far above the national average of 31 persons and the Pacific area average of 63 persons trained in the same period."

"The seven states and Alaska, forming the Red Cross Pacific area, stand on a basis of first aiders per thousand population, as follows: Nevada 90, Oregon 74, Washington 72, California 51, Arizona 50, Idaho 48, and Utah 42. Alaska ties the national average with 31."

"All Red Cross chapters have been teaching of activity since the beginning of the war. Their tempo of work has constantly increased to prepare their populations to meet any form of invasion or emergency," Schafer said. The largest number of persons have been trained in the past year. Many also have continued their work to become volunteer first aiders. This has broken the bottleneck created by the availability of requests for training immediately following Pearl Harbor."

"The Red Cross goal is to have all persons engaged in industry or in farming trained, and to have a first aider in every home in America."

"The five and one-half million new first aiders trained during 1942 are one tremendous contribution to America's war effort," Schafer said. "Industrial leaders and workers alike know that first aid training not only is im-

portant in case of accident, but it actually prevents accidents. A first aider is alert—he is a better worker."

There are a number of competent first aid instructors in Douglas county; classes are in progress most of the time. Anyone desiring to avail themselves of first aid instruction may do so by contacting Miss Verna Carothers, county first aid chairman.

The Junior Red Cross chairman, Mrs. C. N. Johnston, has just received the following from the Camp White hospital at Medford concerning the large box of articles made by the Junior Red Cross boys and girls and shipped to the hospital just before Christmas: "Words can't express how your attractive Christmas enrol books and other gifts added to the enjoyment of the patients in the station hospital at Camp White. The gaily painted ash cans are being used on the game tables; the scrap, joke and funny books and puzzles are being enjoyed by men in the lounge and in the isolation wards. The combs, stationery and lotion were used as gifts at the Christmas program which was given Christmas eve. The program consists of a variety show, carol singing and a visit from Santa Claus. The men enjoyed the beautifully wrapped gifts immensely. They liked the attractive carol booklets so much they took them at the end of the program."

"On behalf of the patients, we wish to thank each of you for your enthusiasm and interest in their Christmas festivity."

A regional conference of Red Cross workers and interested persons will be held at the Umpqua hotel Friday, January 29, 19 to 1. The purpose of the meeting is final organization of the war fund drive, which will be held during the entire month of March. At 11 o'clock Mr. J. A. Laux, Red Cross field director at Camp White, will be the speaker; other good speakers will be heard during the day. Representatives from Coos, Curry, Jackson, Josephine and Lane counties will be present. Anyone interested is welcome to attend. Reservation for the luncheon at noon can be made by phoning 1673.
