limiting flying and ground operations.

Air Blows Traded

Allied planes bombed German-held Bizerte hitting a docked ship, attacked a convoy between Sicily and Tunisia, damaging two ships, and shot down 12 enemy aircraft. Four allied planes were lost.

The German communique reported the bombing of Algiers, the destruction of three transports and two destroyers and the damaging of three other vessels. The Germans said 19 allied planes were destroyed.

Reporting on the Russian campaign, Hitler's headquarters said the red army was attacking violently with artillery and tanks

Supervisor Here—W. H. Shogren, Salem, assistant state supervisor of war production training, was in Roseburg today. Mr. Shogren is in charge of supervision and audit of schools conducted under the state vocational education system for training in war production and he spent the day here at the wedding school, sponsored jointly by the state agency and the district school board.

In the Leningrad area south of Lake Ladoga, The Germans said the Russians were repulsed and that the Stalingrad situation was unchanged.

The latest Russian success was scored west of Voronezh, about midway between Moscow and Stalingrad. Deep German defenses were shattered on a 44-mile front and the Russians declared that parts of nine divisions were sealed tightly in a trap east of recaptured Kastornoye.

Axial Toll Mounting

In three days of advances ranging up to 31 miles, the Russians killed or captured 26,500 of the foe and wiped out an entire Italian Alpine corps, 11,000 of whom were captured. In this bag were three of Mussolini's generals.

Springing forward beyond the captured rail junction of Kropotkin, 130 miles southeast of Rostov in the Caucasus, the Russians said they captured more towns. Advances also were made on the lower Don, where the red army stood only 56 miles short of Rostov, kingdom of the whole German position in the south.

The British bombers scored over Lorient again last night, battering that French nest of Nazi submarines.

Four British planes were lost over Lorient in the sixth allied raid on the bay of Biscay base in 16 days.

American Flying Fortresses and Liberators destroyed 22 German fighters in Wednesday's large scale raid on the Wilhelmshaven submarine base and the Emden industrial area, the eighth U. S. air force announced in London today.

Fliers who took part in the raid reported that the German defending force numbered only about 25 planes, which would mean that the Americans knocked out almost the entire opposition.

Indians Defeat Cavemen in First Of 2-Game Card

Victory Repetition Tonight Will Lift RHS Into Tie For Lead of Conference

The Roseburg high school Indians defeated Grants Pass high 30 to 22 last night and need only a win in tonight's contest to go back into a tie for first place in the Southern Oregon league. The two teams will meet at the senior high school gymnasium tonight in their second game. A preliminary will precede the main battle.

The Indians last night led the scoring for the entire distance, 9 to 5 in the first quarter, 15 to 12 at the half, 29 to 18 in the third period. The Cavemen brought the score up to within one point of Roseburg, 11 to 12, midway in the second period, but the Indians put on the pressure to hold a three-point margin at half-time, and came back in the third period to stage a beautiful defensive show.

Loomis and Cummings held the spotlight for the Indians in last night's game. Loomis used his height to advantage and had excellent control of rebounds off the backboard. He was closely seconded by James, but the latter chalked up three personal fouls early in the game as a result of contact under the basket and was replaced by Anderson until the last period.

Cummings found the range of the basket during the second half and collected nine of Roseburg's 15 points during the last two frames. He also held the assignment of guarding his former teammate Neil Schrimpt, ex-Roseburg player, and Schrimpt was held without a field goal.

Gray was high scorer for the visitors with eight points, while he and R. Martindale were outstanding in defensive play.

Both teams played a cautious game, taking few chances. The Cavemen had much difficulty in sinking their shots from the floor, partially because of the very close checking by the Roseburg defense.

NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—(AP)—Unless the backbreakers' union bars Willie Pep for flagrant violation of the rules on overwork, he probably will whisk his record winning streak 'way up into the stratosphere this year with one of the busiest campaigns ever mapped out for a big-time thumper.

For, less than ten minutes after he polished off Lightweight Allie Stolz in 10 rounds in Madison Square gardens last night, thereby running his string to 59 wins in a row, the featherweight package of pep was hollering for another opponent for Monday.

From the way he floored Allie and "finished galloping" to take the decision, there doesn't appear to be anyone in the way just now to put a stop to Willie's string, which has no equal in the modern record books.

He spotted Stolz nearly six pounds, but looked stronger than the Newark stylist all the way, except for a few moments of the fourth and eighth rounds, and punched faster in all but a few instances.

Huskies Defeat Oregon, OSC Noses Out Idaho

The University of Washington basketball team turned on the heat in Seattle last night to run away from the University of Ore-

gon five in the second half and increased their hold on the north-division lead with a decisive 46 to 31 victory. Washington led 19-16 at the half.

Moved into a tie with Washington State for second place by defeating the University of Idaho 52-49 in the hottest game played on the Moscow floor this season and one that was in doubt until the last whistle. The halftime score was a 22-22 tie.
