Seed Growers Outline Program For Current Year

While the small seed industry in Oregon now has almost an unlimited market for its output, it is faced with many problems of production right now, and of distribution in the postwar period, according to information brought out at the second annual meeting of the Oregon Seed Growers league held at Eugene.

President Glenn Ritchey of Forest Grove was re-elected, as were E. R. Jackman, and Clifford Smith, assistant secretary, both of Oregon State college. Bernal Hugg, Elgin, and Raymond Johnson, Eugene, were re-elected directors, while Evan Green, Ontario, was chosen director from that district.

Among the immediate problems considered serious is that of obtaining enough rotenone poison to control weevil and aphids on legume cover crop seed acreage and enough bags to insure handling the 1943 crops. Control of the clover leaf weevil which is threatening the ladino clover industry in central Oregon, and the hairy vetch weevil, which has already stopped commercial production in some parts of the northern Willamette valley, are other production problems for which more research was asked.

Special committees dealing with the various branches of the Oregon seed industry brought in detailed reports which were adopted as a guide for the future.

Hay Shortage to Increase Wheat Use by Dairies

With the market supplies of hay becoming extremely light all along the Pacific coast, prices have moved up sharply during recent weeks to the highest levels for many years, according to the weekly hay market review broadcast on KOAC by the O. S. C. extension service.

These conditions lend emphasis to the information contained in a new food-for-victory bulletin on feeding wheat to milk cows under wartime conditions first released as Extension Bulletin 611.

The bulletin points out that if wheat for dairy cattle is ground coarsely it can be fed up to 50 per cent of the grain ration without ill effects and that it has been fed up to 75 per cent with no trouble except some loss of palatability. The bulletin shows the comparative value of different feeds at different prices, and gives directions for preparing various concentrate mixtures containing large amounts of coarsely ground wheat.

Better Buy Than Alfalfa. From the standpoint of total digestible nutrients, if ground wheat can be purchased at \$10 a ton or less it is a better buy than alfalfa hay at \$25 a ton, according to the bulletin. More wheat feeding can thus serve to "stretch" the hay supply.

One reason for the scarcity of hay available for shipment is the difficulty to obtain labor for haling and hauling. Storms have interfered also, although the supply of hay actually available for movement is probably quite limited, says L. R. Breithaupt, extension economist.

Specific official data as to stocks of hay now on hand are not available, but unofficial reports on hay supplies and livestock numbers, as well as price trends, indicate that supplies of hay are shorter than usual and probably sufficient only for a normal winter at best.

In the event that heavier than normal feeding is required the balance of this winter, the value of Oregon's surplus wheat reserve will become more apparent each month until new feed becomes available, says Breithaupt. Wheat is an excellent feed for other livestock, as well as for milk cows, according to tests made by the Oregon experiment station over a period of years.

Canners Short Course to Feature War Changes

Final information on all government meat regulations pertaining to commercial food processing for this season is expected to be available by the time of the twenty-second annual Canners and Frozen Food Packers school to be held at Oregon State college February 1 to 12.

A large number of managers and operators of such plants from this and other states are expected for the annual short course. Special speakers on defense subjects will be featured and will deal with defense food production problems.

Surplus Dairy Stock in Oregon Being Purchased

PORTLAND, Feb. 1. (AP)—Walter A. Duffy, regional director of the farm security administration, said that the FSA's program to purchase surplus dairy animals opened in Tillamook and Josephine counties last week.

Dairy calves, heifers and cows destined for slaughter because of labor, feed or building shortages will be distributed to farmers who can care for additional stock, Duffy explained.

Standard breed dairy heifers and cows will be purchased on the basis of best prices adjusted upwards in terms of production, he said. Handling costs will be absorbed by the government.

Duffy said farm security loans have enabled smaller farmers to purchase 2300 cows in the last three months.

The new program is designed to save dairy animals for land-use needs, fill the British purchasing commission's postwar order for more than a million cows and prevent rationing of dairy products after the war, he explained.

Other counties will be designated for dairy animal purchase as surpluses become evident, he added.

Farm security field offices will handle the program.

Pointers Given To Save Ailing Ewes

Because many reports of sheep losses due to pregnant ewe paralysis are being received by the state department of agriculture animal division, Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, is urging all sheepmen to take preventive measures. Exercise, water and addition of glucose to the diet are the three main points to measures to prevent this trouble-some malady of sheep flocks.

While veterinarians do not know the exact cause of pregnant ewe paralysis, it is thought the disease results when there are not enough carbohydrates in the system to burn up the protein. For this reason, one of the best treatments is to add glucose or glucose yielding materials such as molasses or syrup and other foods rich in carbohydrates. Early detection of the malady should be followed by stomach tube feeding of one-half pint of molasses or glucose night and morning for the first day. Also a veterinarian may be called to inject dextrose into the blood stream. Oat hay, though carbohydrate, is not good feed for breeding ewes.

Flocks during this season should have also three inches of exercise per day at should be induced to drink much water, especially warm water. The exercise may be pretty well taken care of if feeding and watering is handled at different places.

Many reports are that the disease is seen in ewes carrying lambs. However, it is doubtful if this is any definite factor, as single lambs have been stricken also.

Victory Gardens Plus More Dried Foods Suggested

Universal planting of victory gardens where possible, plus early action to provide community dehydrators and driers, is advocated by E. H. Wiegand, head of the food industries department at Oregon State college, as one way Oregon can help meet the future civilian food supply situation.

After analyzing the estimated pack of canned fruits and vegetables as compared with the amount to be taken by the government for military and lend-lease use, Wiegand says that "while there is no need to go hungry, the newest regulation dealing with the commercial packs of canned food should give us something to think about in connection with our food problems."

Professor Wiegand reports that the estimated total pack of canned vegetables for 1943 will approximate 176,800,000 cases. Of these, 92,900,000 cases will be required by the government. The total pack of canned fruit is estimated at 47,500,000 cases, of which the government will need 31,700,000 cases.

This makes a total output estimated at 224,300,000 cases, of which civilians will receive only 99,700,000. Figures on average civilian consumption between 1937 and 1939 show that America consumed in the neighborhood of 200 million cases annually of canned foods of all kinds.

KITS GIVEN SOLDIERS TO COMBAT SNAKEBITES

TARPON SPRINGS, Fla.—(AP)—An unusual contribution to the war effort is being made by Paul Saunders, 30-year-old secretary of the chamber of commerce here.

He is now filling Army Medical Corps orders for safety kits for protection of soldiers against snakebite in reptile infested areas.

Each kit, a hollow, moisture proof plastic cylinder, contains the following: A handy tourniquet to be placed above the point of the bite to shut off the flow of blood toward the heart; a small knife to make incisions around the wound, allowing it to bleed freely; a novel pump with which to draw off the blood injected by the rattlesnake's bite; three types of pump openings to apply to different parts of the body, depending on the location of the bite; two ammonia capsules as a stimulant to counteract the nervous shock; two iodine swabs to disinfect the wound; and two boracic bandages to be applied to cuts after blood is drawn from the infested area.
