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Farm Debts Reduced

DOUGLAS county farmers during 1942 not only retired an unprecedented amount of indebtedness but built up a substantial reserve fund, according to information contained in a report by R. E. Brown, president of the Federal Land bank of Spokane. The report was received here by R. L. Strickland, secretary-treasurer of the Roseburg office of the National Farm Loan association.

From the information gathered from the summary of land bank activities during the past year, proof is given that the farmer, who for many years has been struggling under low income and difficult market conditions, has vastly improved his financial position, despite the problems of farm labor costs, machinery shortages and other factors which have added greatly to his work and worries.

"Never in the 26 years the land bank has been in operation has it had such a heavy repayment of its loans," the report states. In fact, it is pointed out, the farmers of the Pacific northwest applied eleven million dollars to reduction of indebtedness, bringing the land bank's mortgage loan account to \$83,500,000—the lowest in 20 years. The bank reported that more than \$7,500,000 of the payments it received was used to retire nearly 4,000 loans before they came due.

The repayment of loans and a cut in delinquencies of more than 50 per cent was not all that happened to improve farmers' financial standing, for the land bank received approximately one and one-half million dollars for its future payment fund—an interest-bearing reserve farmers may set up in fat years to meet payments coming due in lean years. Douglas county farmers paid a total of \$16,000 into the reserve, the report states.

Douglas county residents who have been observing the great influx of newcomers will be particularly interested in that section of the report which states that every farm owned by the land bank in Douglas county has been sold and that no real estate now is owned by the bank in this county.

While farmers have been using income to retire indebtedness and build up reserves for possible future emergencies, the money has not been lost to the war effort, for the land bank has purchased \$7,600,000 worth of United States bonds in 1942 as well as reducing its own indebtedness by almost eleven million dollars.

Residents of this area may well rejoice over this improvement in farm finances, for Douglas county, with limited industrial activity, is still dependent largely upon farm income. Business activity is directly affected, almost without exception, by conditions within the agricultural areas and it should be a source of satisfaction to everyone to know that our farmer friends, even though they may be struggling with many problems, are getting at least some measure of the prosperity to which they are entitled.

THERE'S nothing new from Africa.

We're still trying to box Rommel into a trap along the Mediterranean, and the Germans in Tunisia are fighting hard to keep the gate open for him if and when he gets there.

At the times when you feel that the African campaign is going pretty slowly, give a thought to the submarines—which are on another rampage.

There are hints in the news that they're sinking nearly a million tons a month, which is disturbingly close to the total tonnage we're building. There are other hints that the Germans are building submarines twice as fast as we can sink them.

Our convoys to Africa are, of course, good hunting for the undersea boats.

THE general picture of the news is favorable. The submarine situation distinctly isn't favorable. Not much is being said about it, but what little the insiders let out has a worried tone.
