Ex-Sheriff Convicted in Hunting Tragedy

PENDLETON, Ore., Feb. 5.—(AP)—Attorneys for S. E. Roberts, convicted of involuntary manslaughter by a Umatilla county circuit court jury last night, prepared a motion for a new trial today.

Roberts, former Deschutes county sheriff and Bend police chief, was found guilty of the slaying of E. W. Kain, Sandy, on an elk hunting trip in the Blue mountains near Ukiah last fall. The jury deliberated less than four hours.

Oregon law provides prison sentence from one to 15 years for conviction of involuntary manslaughter.

H. S. Gile, Prominent in Prune Industry, Dies

Word was received here today of the death at Salem of Herman S. Gile, founder of H. S. Gile and company, prune packers. The company for many years has operated a branch plant in Roseburg. A resident of Oregon since 1880, he was one of the first to engage in the prune packing business in this state and was the first to introduce prune and other fruit and berry juices. He was an uncle of Robert C. Gile, representative from Douglas county to the state legislature.

The Roseburg high school Indians left today for Medford for two critical conference games with Medford. The Medford Pear Pickers will be really serious in the effort to beat the Indians in view of the two successive defeats by one-point margins experienced in the games here. The Indians won 32 to 31 and 27 to 26 in two sensational contests here Jan. 8 and 9. The Pear Pickers have been smarting under the sting of the two close games and have been pointing for the return matches with the Indians.

Coach Hod Turner planned to remain in Grants Pass until shortly before game time and to go in to Medford just in time to start warm-up.

The Indians are in excellent spirits for the game, Turner reports, and have built up a considerable measure of confidence after their exhibition in toppling the league-leading Grants Pass Cavemen here last week, to go into a tie for first place.

The team has been drilled intensively this week on ball handling and defensive plays designed to stop Weir and Fawcett, the Medford team's ace.

Recruiting Staff of WAAC will Visit Roseburg

Lieutenant Margaret Horn, recruiting representative for the women's army auxiliary corps, will be in Roseburg Thursday and Friday, February 11 and 12, to meet with women interested in the opportunities offered for service with the WAACs. It was announced today by Mrs. Ethel G. Roselund, local representative. She will be accompanied by members of the Oregon recruiting and induction district staff and will come to Roseburg in the new WAAC recruiting mobile unit, which will be parked in the down town area between 2 and 6 p. m. Thursday and 10 a. m. and 1 p. m. Friday to serve as headquarters for the recruiting party.

The recent expansion of the corps from 25,000 to 150,000 members has opened many new branches of service, Mrs. Roselund reports, and Lieutenant Horn will be glad, she states, to discuss the general and special departments with women interested. Present qualifications for enrollment require that applicants be between the ages of 21 and 44 years, inclusive, in good physical condition and of good moral character. Enrollees will receive four weeks basic training either at Fort Des Moines, Iowa, or Daytona Beach, Fla. Linguists are particularly needed, it is reported in recruiting announcements.

At Corvallis the University of Idaho will meet Oregon State the same nights, and the Beavers will be without the steady influence and sharp shooting of Don Durdan.

Dr. Waldo Bell, Beaver physician, said an eye infection would keep Durdan out of basketball competition for the remainder of the year and might force his withdrawal from school until the spring term. This announcement was a rude jolt to the already slim hopes the Beavers held of repeating their Pacific Coast conference victory of last year. To-night and Saturday they will be struggling to keep ahead of the Vandals and out of the cellar.

Durdan had just recovered from chickenpox. The eye infection will not have permanent effects, Dr. Bell said.
