The burdens will be heavier on every home and burdens will be crushing for many, many hearts. Words are the means of communication between the thoughts and hearts of individuals, the cement that unites a nation in a common spirit, the lever that helps us lift and share our burdens.

"The new canned food rationing program is a direct challenge to the patriotism of American women," declared Mrs. Alfred J. Mathewat, of Alameda, California, national president of the American Legion auxiliary, in a statement issued today from the national headquarters at Indianapolis. Mrs. Mathewat pointed out that the women of America are the arbiters of family buying and that there can be no hoarding of foodstuffs if they will not tolerate it.

Mrs. Mathewat further stated: "As national president of the American Legion auxiliary, the largest patriotic women's organization in our country, I am appealing to every woman in the nation to wholeheartedly cooperate in the government's new food rationing program."

"First, abstain from panic buying in order to prevent a run on available supplies of canned food. No one will go hungry under the rationing program."

"Second, make an honest declaration of your stock of canned goods on your pantry shelf. You will retain your self-respect. Your conscience will never brand you a slacker."

"If our fighting men are willing to die for our country, we, the women of America, should be willing to do without a few cans of food. Our soldiers and sailors are fighting for us because we believe in fair play. Let it never be said that the women of America do not play fair in doing their full share in cooperating in this rationing program which is of vital importance."

Mrs. Culp reported that the state program chairman praised all local groups for the form of programs used this year. The Junior-Senior high school organization with H. B. Carter as president, was especially pointed out as having an unusually fine program plan.

Guest speaker for the afternoon was Miss Martha Shamberger, field worker for the T. B. association of Oregon. Charts were used to show need of case finding, age groups in relation to time element and difference in graphline in women and men who have active T. B. Need for case finding in groups where it is definitely known that the bulk of cases are being made by cause of occupation was emphasized by the speaker. She told of the importance of education of individuals who have some organic weakness so that they know how to live happy lives through proper exercise and kind of work possible in relation to their physical condition. During the last world war and immediately afterward, the increase in T. B. was 170% in parts of Europe robbed of food. The chief food factor to be found wanting was protein and because of this fact, meat substitutes are urged to study meat substitutes carefully and learn to like the kinds of meat that are designated for civilian use.
