The Medford high school Tigers secured their revenge for the two one-point defeats suffered at Roseburg when they swept the two-game series at Medford Friday and Saturday. After winning 30 to 26 Friday night, Medford took an exciting, rough game Saturday night 39 to 33 and thus secured a tie with Roseburg for second place in league standings.

Medford opened Saturday night's game with a very fast drive in which they piled up 12 points in the first period, while the Indians were converting only one free throw. Roseburg found the range in the second period, however, and at half-time the score was 24 to 15 in Medford's favor. The Indians continued their rally in the third period and midway in that frame stepped out in front 27 to 24. The game took on a very fast and rough appearance and Wimbler, who was the leading scorer for Roseburg, was chased to the showers early in the fourth period and followed by Cummings and Anderson. These losses from personal fouls considerably weakened the Roseburg squad during the last few minutes of play, in which Medford slowly drew out of danger.

The senate passed and sent to the house a bill to increase the industrial accident commission's reserve fund from \$500,000 to \$4,500,000, and sent to the governor a bill to appropriate \$10,850, to the state defense council for the period from Feb. 1 to next July 1.

a seaplane station were hit at Cagliari, the commune from allied headquarters in north Africa reported. Five challenging axis fighters were declared to have been shot down without loss to the formation of B-17 Flying Fortresses, B-26 Marauders and the P-38 Lightning escort.

British Wellington bombers followed up this attack with raids on other Sardinian air fields last night.

The harbor of Algiers, an allied base, was reported by the Italians to have been raided last night, the bombers setting large fires.

The multiple aerial blows were launched as rain and mud again bogged down the allied ground campaign in Tunisia, restricting activity to patrols.

A further closing of the allied pincers upon Marshal Rommel was indicated, however, by a Cairo communique which said British eighth army troops were in contact with the enemy in the coastal region of the Tripolitanian-Tunisian border west of Pisi-da and they were believed to be preparing for a new attack.

liberal as the ration. The coupons will be taken from the sugar coffee ration books already in everybody's hands. No. 17 stamp will be good for one pair of shoes until June 15. At least for the present, there will be no registration, no questionnaires, no waiting in line.

New Yorkers listening to Mayor LaGuardia's regular weekly radio talk yesterday had a hint of what was to come an hour before the announcement, and soon throngs swarmed through the lower east side jamming shoe stores which close on Saturday, the Jewish sabbath, and remain open on Sunday.

The Washington Post said today that a check-up on shoe dealers here showed a number did a rushing business late Saturday, and some dealers said the flurry was caused by "an apparent advance tip on yesterday's shoe rationing announcement."

The paper said that in every instance checked the dealers said that "buyers" appeared to be government officials or employees, and added another indication that government workers were doing the buying was "that the rush did not start until after most government departments had closed for the day."

Ciano Sent to Vatican; Peace Move Suspected

BERN, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Premier Mussolini's appointment of his son-in-law, Count Ciano, as ambassador to the Vatican was interpreted by some neutral sources today as motivated by a desire to establish channels for peace efforts.

The press in neutral European countries showed much more interest in Ciano's assignment to Vatican City than in the previous erratic shapshoot of Mussolini's cabinet, in which Ciano lost his post of foreign minister.

It was pointed out that in Vatican City he might have a chance to establish contacts with envoys of the united nations.

Ciano came to the vatican post, the Tribune said, "at a moment when the war is reaching a decisive turn, the armies are feeling painfully the wear of 3½ years of battles and the peoples are aspiring ardently for peace."

Rutledge Confirmed as Supreme Court Justice

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—(AP)—The senate confirmed today President Roosevelt's nomination of Wiley Blount Rutledge of Iowa to be an associate justice of the supreme court, succeeding James F. Byrnes, now economic stabilization director.

Deportation Barrier Denied Harry Bridges

SACRAMENTO, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Federal Judge Welsh today denied an application by Harry Bridges, west coast longshoremen's leader, for a writ of habeas corpus to forestall deportation to Australia.

Bridges had applied for the writ on the grounds that U. S. Attorney Biddle acted illegally last year when he ordered the labor leader deported.
